

# HOUSE VOTES FOR ARMY OF 115,000 MEN

Washington, March 22.—The house gave its approval today to a provision of the army appropriation bill which would require the reduction by July of the regular army enlisted strength to 115,000 men and then proceeded to vote upon a proposed discussion of whether congress should direct the return to the United States of certain troops stationed in China, Hawaii, the Panama Canal Zone and on the Rhine. Secretary Weeks has already ordered the withdrawal of the troops from the Rhine.

The bill provides that before the beginning of the coming fiscal year 1923, 6,800 troops stationed in Hawaii, 2,000 men on duty in the Canal Zone and the entire force of 600 personnel in China as well as all but 500 men and officers in the army of occupation in Germany must be brought back to continental United States.

Representative Crane, republican, Pennsylvania, raised a point of order against the provision on the ground that congress was attempting to usurp the power of the president to direct troop movements. The point of order was overruled, however, by Representative Longworth, republican, Ohio, who declared that while he did so "with personal regret" he believed congress in appropriating for maintenance of troops could properly place such limitations on the president and his department.

A motion to eliminate the provision from the bill was then made by Representative Rogers, republican, Massachusetts, but the house adjourned before a vote was taken. The bill will be taken up again Friday.

After extended discussion the house by a decisive majority rejected amendments which would have fixed the maximum enlisted strength at levels other than the 115,000 recommended by the sub-committee which framed the bill. Chairman Kahn of the military affairs committee proposed that pay be provided for 140,000 men, exclusive of 2,000 Philippine scouts. Representative Elison, democrat, Michigan, a member of the sub-committee in charge of the bill offered an amendment to reduce the maximum to 100,000 while Representative Quinn, democrat, Mississippi, urged that the number of enlisted men be slashed to 50,000.

Another amendment, rejected by the house was offered by Representative

Kroesen, republican, Minnesota, and would have given men stationed outside continental United States the privilege of demanding their discharge from the military service while the size of the army was being reduced. As the bill stands only those on duty in this country would be eligible for discharge on any basis.

During discussion of the reduced strength provision both Mr. Sisson and Representative Mann, republican, Illinois, predicted that the senate would insist on a larger army than the house, and that the figure finally agreed upon would be in excess of that fixed by the house.

Mr. Kahn said he wanted an army large enough to cope with any situation. Declaring that the United States was not really at peace with Mexico, he added that "we also have a situation in the west which may lead to trouble."

At the outset today the house voted down a series of amendments which would have increased the \$250,000 carried for the officers reserve corps to amounts as high as \$3,200,000.

### CAUTION AUTOMOBILE OWNERS

#### 25007 MUTILATED NUMBERS

As part of the effort to combat the increasing trade in stolen and "bogus" automobiles, and to protect the Connecticut public as far as possible, the motor vehicle department has incorporated in a booklet for distribution among automobile dealers and repairers a statement cautioning the latter to keep a sharp lookout for engine or serial numbers that have been tampered with.

The booklet points out that a law adopted by the last session of the legislature renders liable to immediate arrest any person found to have in his possession any motor vehicle with a mutilated factory or engine number regardless of whether the possessor bought it in good faith. No such person can be discharged from custody until he has proved to the satisfaction of the proper court the ownership of the motor vehicle in question and his right to it.

"Dealers and repairers are cautioned to acquaint themselves with the law regarding engine or serial numbers. If any doubt exists the dealer or repairer should communicate with the state police department without delay."

This caution is only one feature of the booklet, which may be obtained without cost by the dealer or repairer. It also contains all essential information about motor vehicle laws and regulations affecting dealers and repairers.

Another booklet just issued by the department deals exclusively with motor truck laws and regulations, and emphasizes, among other things, that drivers who permit automobile trucks to cast down hills will be "rigorously prosecuted, as the practice is considered one of the most dangerous elements to be contended with on the highways."


