METHODIST CONFERENCE ACCEPTS INVITATION TO NEW LONDON

(Special to The Bulletin) Pawtucket, March 31.—The Friday morning session of the Methodist New England Southern Conference was opened at 8:40 o'clock with prayer by Bishop Hughes.

The report of New Bedford district was presented by the superintendent, Rev. John E. Newland, D. D., and contained among many interesting things the following items: There were three weddings and three births in the parsonage home. Over \$46,500 has been raised for improvements and in payment of debts. More than \$12,000 has been received in bequests among the churches. There have been 299 persons received into full membership and 260 into preparatory membership during the year. Nineteen churches report an aggregate increase in the pastor's salary to the extent of \$2,527. This district has reported an increase in the past three and one-half years, the first of which was \$12,550, per cent, aggregating \$12,550. Special work in several parts of the district is carried on among the Portuguese.

Mrs. Wilfred Greer, wife of Rev. Jerome Greer, addressed the conference in a very pleasing manner concerning the work of the Woman's Home Missionary Society. Both Mr. and Mrs. Greer will be pleasantly remembered in Norwich where Mr. Greer served North Town and North Main Street churches from 1905 to 1919.

Rev. E. Talmage Root, D. D., represented the work of the Massachusetts Society for the Federation of Churches, and Miss B. Marion Hope, superintendent of the Fall River Deaconess Home, addressed the conference in the interest of that institution. The following were upon motion, received into full membership in the conference, they having served the customary two years on trial: Clifford R. Chase, Adlai P. Schmalzer, Samuel T. Lippold and William A. Reynolds, they having answered satisfactorily the usual disciplinary questions. Following this came the great evening work, viz., the address of the bishop to the entire class. Bishop Hughes spoke on the parental instinct as an essential to a minister's best work. For about an hour he held the conference in a most interesting manner, but orderly succession to both humor and pathos including anecdotes from his own life and closing with a most eloquent and powerful benediction.

Robert Cushman of Pawtucket spoke in behalf of the Near East Relief for orphan children. A resolution endorsing this work was adopted. The following were advanced to the studies of the fourth year: Marion C. Creager, Philip D. Norwell and Truman H. Woodward. Philip A. Aborn and Rowell W. Bosworth were advanced to the studies of the third year. Dean James A. Beebe of the Boston University School of Theology was introduced and spoke briefly of that school and its work. A resolution endorsing the appeal of this school was adopted.

The following were elected for continuation as local preachers: George H. Wilbur, Edwin Wilbur, Theodore Peterson, Bernard H. Worthen, Charles M. Condit and Leslie B. Veary. Earl E. Story having completed the course of study was upon motion graduated from the same and elected a local preacher. S. Raymond Lufly was elected to Elder's orders under the mistaken title and Russell W. Bosworth to Elder's orders as a local preacher. An invitation to the conference to hold its next annual session at New London, Conn. was presented by Senator Miner of that place and cordially accepted by a unanimous vote.

GRADUAL IMPROVEMENT IN ECONOMIC CONDITIONS

New York, March 31.—Business on the New York Stock Exchange for the last quarter of the year has reflected a gradual improvement in financial, industrial and general economic conditions from the acute depression of 1921. Sales of stocks in the three months ending March 31 were \$1,240,000,000, higher quotations, amounted roughly to 55,000,000 shares against 43,000,000 shares in the corresponding quarter last year. There were also marked gains in sales of "odd lots" and in private dealings.
