WEATHER Conditions

Wednesday night a disturbance of considerable intensity was central over Lake Huron and moving toward the St. Lawrence valley, and at the same time a secondary disturbance was off the Virginia Capes. The latter storm has been attended by gales with rain over the lower lake region and snow in the upper lake region. The extreme upper Mississippi valley and the Dakotas, while the secondary disturbance has been attended by rains in the Atlantic and Gulf states. Storm warnings were issued for the Great Lakes Wednesday morning and Wednesday night. South-west storm warnings were ordered for the Atlantic coast and north of Sandy Hook.

WILL DECIDE WHETHER CHILD WAS FOUNDLING

Judge Charles B. Walker held a hearing in the court of common pleas in New London Tuesday afternoon of the habeas corpus action of Mrs. Helen Senz of Norwich against Mr. and Mrs. Carl Russell of New Street, New London, to regain possession of Anton Kurdelian, alias Anton Pirovsky, 13 years old, who she claims is her son and who she alleges is being confined and detained by the Russell family illegally and unlawfully. Judge Walker held the matter under advisement for a week at the conclusion of the hearing.

Mrs. Senz testified at the hearing that in October, 1912, while residing in New London she went to Fall River to be married a second time and left three minor children of whom Anton was the youngest. She is about 12 years old in the custody of a man and two women boarders to care for. A few days after she was there she said that she received a letter advising her not to come back as her children had been taken away to a home.

It developed, according to testimony, that the oldest daughter of Mrs. Senz married during her mother's absence and reclaimed the three children but that soon after she went to Russia and Anton found his way into the home of a family in Groton. The Russell then living in Groton heard that a home was sought for the child and they took him and three weeks later adopted the child.

The adoption proceedings were substantiated by testimony of A. P. Hawley, at that time secretary of the town of Groton and Judge Arthur P. Anderson, judge of the probate court, and town records were introduced into evidence.

At the conclusion of the hearing, Judge Walker stated that the question involved was whether the child was a foundling under the provisions of the state statutes at the time and he took the matter under consideration.

DECLARE GARDNER'S LAKE ROAD WORST IN STATE

For a curiosity in the way of road warning signs, the town of Montville takes the prize in a stretch of road between this city and Gardner's lake. At a spot where a big hole has been followed out in the line of travel a tree has been plucked out of a neighboring lot and stuck up in the hole.

Travelers may at least be thankful for some warning as this, but, according to some automobilists who use the road frequently, it would be entirely without reason to have the road marked as impassable to ordinary travel at this season of the year after it leaves the Lefebvre town line and enters the town of Montville.

A tortuous trail of deep ruts and holes among, in and around outcropping stones has been worn by the wheels of lumber-loaded trailers that are used over the road by a lumber camp. They make a path that automobilists and other vehicles struggle along with peril to wheels and springs and extreme discomfort to passengers who unite in declaring that there couldn't be a worse piece of road in the state.

How to Rid the Arms of Objectionable Hairs

(Aids to Beauty)

A simplified method is here given for the quick removal of hairy or fuzzy growths and rarely is more than one treatment required. Mix a stiff paste with some powdered detolone and water, apply to hairy surface and after 2 or 3 minutes rub off, wash the skin and every hair has vanished. This simple treatment cannot cause injury but care should be exercised to get real detolone.
