EXPLAIN STRANGE LIGHTS ON MOUNTAIN

Washington, May 18.—Application of science and common sense have lifted out of the supernatural the "strange lights" on Brown mountain which for some years have agitated residents of Burke and adjacent counties in North Carolina. It was announced today by the United States Geological survey, G. R. Mansfield, geologist, detailed to study the phenomenon, has returned after two weeks' investigation with the conclusion that the lights are common "every night" lights, given unusual red and yellow tints by air currents.

Mrs. Welcome Sheldon who has been afflicted with a hard cold the past week, is somewhat improved.


There was no school Wednesday as it was visiting day. Mrs. Eva Huntington visited schools in Webster.
