DANIELSON AND PUTNAM NEWS

DANIELSON Frederick A. Beach, of Lynn, Mass., left here Friday morning, adjusting with the authorities such matters as they required should be given immediate attention, following the accident in which Mr. Beach's car struck Mrs. William H. Devolve and so injured her that she died within a few minutes, at Plainfield, Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Beach gave a bond of \$500 for his reappearance in this county at such time as the coroner may desire.

The public in Moosup and elsewhere in the town of Plainfield, as well as in this immediate territory, will watch with interest Monday the action of the 700 employees of the Aldrich Manufacturing company at Moosup as returning to their employment when the big plant resumes operations. The day will tell, it is all probability, whether the strike is to be definitely broken or whether it is to drag on indefinitely.

It was pointed out Friday that the Aldrich company is the only one manufacturing cotton textiles in this part of northern New England that did not put into effect the last cut of 1-5 per cent. made general in cotton manufacturing plant throughout New England many months ago. The operatives of this company have continued to enjoy the higher wages of the company which was laid on the fact that the plant operates only 50 hours each week, several hours less than other cotton mill operatives in the territory are getting in each week, and that these fifty hours of labor are accomplished in five days, leaving Saturday as a full holiday, the week's work ending Friday night.

Notwithstanding their favorable position as compared with that of thousands of other cotton mill workers in this territory, who have had to stand a cut of 22 1-2 per cent. more than their Moosup fellow workers and are working five hours a week longer, the Moosup workers are on strike and the other workers are sticking to their jobs. This is what makes the Moosup situation so interesting to thousands who are, or are not, employed as textile workers.

There is a possibility that Danielson people, with others in this territory, will later enjoy the convenience of procuring automobile registration plates at the state police barracks here instead of being required to send to Hartford for them, as has been the rule since cars first carried numbers. Some of the larger cities of the state now have stations at which registration plates may be obtained, and it has been hinted that the same rule will be adopted for Danielson, and probably for other coming of the new year. It plans now under consideration are carried out, the police barracks here will be equipped to handle registrations. This will be a convenience to many who have some difficulty in filling out applications in their present somewhat complicated form and in figuring out accurately the charges for registration.

Officers and men of the Service battery of the 12nd field artillery which has been at Camp Eustis, Va., since the first of the month, are preparing to leave for home today, and glad to get back to get back to New England, where it is cooler—sometimes.

The battery was scheduled to leave for home Friday afternoon and the boys are expected here late today.
