

BASEBALL HEADS DISCUSS MANY THINGS AT JOINT MAJOR MEETING

Chicago, Aug. 14.—(By the A. P.)—Changes in the dates on which major league clubs must cut their rosters to 25 players and on which trading or sales of ball players can be consummated, were given unanimous approval today in an informal discussion at the joint meeting of the National and American leagues before Commissioner K. M. Landis.

No definite action on these matters, however, was taken today, it being necessary to officially vote on the subject, but the unanimous approval of those attending today's session assured the adoption of the changes at the next annual meeting.

William Veck, president of the Chicago National league club, suggested a change in the playing limit to 15 players to June 15. He believed this would give a club more opportunity to try out its recruits before being committed to a roster.

Barney Dreyfus, president of the Pittsburgh Nationals, did not approve of buying or selling ball players in mid-season and asked that a change be made. Mr. Dreyfus was well supported by the other club owners present from both leagues.

Both teams that contend in the world series are required to disband immediately after its close and the members thereof are forbidden to participate in exhibition games during the year which that world's championship was decided.

The matter of barn-storming by world series players, the only official business before the meeting, it being agreed that the joint meeting was called for this purpose.

Nothing Done on Draft
It was said that several of the club owners brought up the question of the draft, but nothing materialized.
