

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

MARKET WAS TREMULOUS

New York, Sept. 15.—Price movements in today's stock market were again irregular and influenced by professional activities, but the main trend continued upward. There was a noticeable slackening of bear pressure on a less vigorous speculative buying with the result that changes were largely within narrower limits. The undertone continued strong.

Public utility issues made the most spirited advance, gains of 1 to 3 points in that group bringing many stocks to new high records for the year. Consolidated Gas was actively traded, closing at a net gain of 1-5/8 points, and there was substantial improvement also in Peoples Gas, Lehigh Valley and North American. Columbia and Pacific Gas, after an early display of strength, shaded a bit on realising sales.

Several new favorites were brought to the fore, notably Epison, Texas Gulf Sulphur, Freeport Texas and Inland, most of which registered moderate gains. Wilson company packing stock advanced more than 2 1/2 points on the revival of merger rumors. Pool operations were in evidence in some of these special stocks.

Stocks and equipments were quite active, but with the exception of a decline of 1-3/4 in Baldwin, due largely to week-end profit taking, the changes in these groups were only nominal changes. Shading shares, such as Woolworth, Kresge and May department stores, were taken in hand and pushed to higher grounds. There was fair activity also in copper shares, gains of a point or more being recorded by Utah and Butte and Superior with fractional gains elsewhere in the list.

Total sales approximated 1,100,000 shares. Foreign exchange rates were again irregular with a narrower range of variation. There was a renewal of optimism in the market.

New York, Sept. 15.—Pronounced weakness in bonds of the Princeton government and French municipal issues imparted an irregular trend today's dealings in bonds on the New York stock exchange.

Mixed changes prevailed in the railroad list. New Orleans and Mexico's bonds advanced 1/2 point, while Erie and Great Northern declined 1/4 point.

Investment issues were in good demand throughout the day and a large over-the-counter trade was reported. Total sales (par value) were \$14,684,000.
