

KACEYS STRENGTHEN TEAM FOR GAMES WITH EASTERN LEAGUE CLUBS

When the Norwich K. of C. and the New Haven club, champions of the Eastern League, face each other Saturday at the Fairgrounds here, two hard hitting teams will meet and the fans of this section of the state are assured of a real game.

New Haven is now engaged in a three game series with the Baltimore Orioles for the Minor-League championship and at present stands game in game with them, the deciding game of the series to be played at New Haven today.

The Elm City team when it trots out onto the diamond Saturday will present a team that has tackled the "apple" for a team average of better than .300 this season, four of its players having batting records of hit and average for 110 games and over. Leading this hard hitting team is Bowman at first base who in 141 games has hit safe for 294 times an average of .348. He is closely followed at hitting by Eays at center field who has hit for .327 in the last 100 games.

In the last quarter Westery held for four days and finally got the ball and with fast running added another 6 points, to which in the last quarter they made seven more bringing the final score to 26-0.

Another new man on the team will be Tom Cosgrove of the Norwich team who will cover center field. Cosgrove likes to hit and has an average of .251.
