

GREEN REVOLUTIONARIES

Victorious Troops Marched Triumphant into the City of Athens—Crown Prince Has Taken the Oath as King—Assumes Name of George I—New Government is in the Hands of a Military Dictatorship—The Main Object of the Revolt Was the Determination to Maintain Greek Rule in Eastern Thrace—Greek Vessels Under the Protection of the American Flag Took 20,000 Refugees From Smyrna.

London, Sept. 25.—The Greek revolution, which was a military coup d'etat, seems to have been carried out with surprising ease and completeness. Information regarding Constantine in the hands of the revolutionaries, which was a prisoner of the revolutionists. The crown prince succeeds to the throne, while the victorious troops with their leaders at their head march triumphantly into Athens, which, pending the formation of a new government, is in the hands of a military dictatorship in the shape of a triumvirate consisting of three generals. One of the generals is said to be the famous General Nider, who for a long time was chief of staff and war minister under the Venizelos administration and commanded the Greek expeditionary corps operating in south Russia in 1918.

Apparently the revolution was bloodless, although an unconfirmed report mentions the killing of one minister. It is assumed that some of the main objects of the revolution is to maintain Greek rule in eastern Thrace.

Constantinople, Sept. 25.—(By the A. P.)—Although there are a half a million Greeks with Venizelist sympathies in Constantinople, the day passed quietly. Animated groups on the street corners and in the cafes discussed the fate of Constantinople and the probable complexion of the next government. Some expressed the hope that a republic would succeed the monarchy, with Venizelos an incident; others favored the appointment of a republic, while a surprising number advocated the ascendency of Prince George.

As soon as the first news of the overthrow of the king was received here, excited crowds clamored at the newspaper offices seeking confirmation. Ample and allied news agencies reported that the event would have on the peace negotiations and the situation in Thrace, some professing the fiercest moderating attitude on the part of the Kemalists. The view of the reorganization of the Greek army, and the likelihood of a determined Thracian offensive under the inspiration of Venizelos.

Having promised Thrace to Turkey, the allies are confronted with the problem of sending the Greeks to the front. On the other hand, many observers believe that the Kemalists will be eager to complete their victory before the dividend they close their ranks and regain its strength.

King Constantine sat with the queen and other members of the royal family grouped about him, in the garden of the summer palace at Taoli, just outside of Athens. The ladies stood apart, clearly the "Elysian" stood apart, clearly the king brought dispatches disclosing latest developments.

The prime minister had just arrived, bringing from the capital reports of events throughout the realm. The king seemed at hand. But the king still sits with Turkey. For peace was never signed with the Ottoman empire. We went on with that war as one of the allies, and mind you we went on under the mandate of the peace treaty. Our valiant army fought at terrific odds and under disheartening conditions. Every day they saw one of the allies supplying them with ammunition, bombs, guns and motor lorries. They could not light an organization like that, and so they simply went on a strike.

From the standpoint of the interests of Europe, I cannot see the advantage of allowing the Turks to occupy both sides of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus. History speaks for itself. Will the Turks, even and even, be met with a different treatment from the powers, or any different in the future, and will the neutrality of the Dardanelles and the safety of Europe, be assured thereby scarcely think so. What about the brave English dead at Gallipoli—the heroes from America and New Zealand over 100,000 of them who gave their lives in the terrible war against Turkey? Do these dead mean nothing to England? In her hands over Asia Minor and Thrace to the Turkey which she won of her dominions? What about the 200,000 Christians who have perished or been massacred in Asia Minor by the Turks? No punishment, but reward, handed out graciously to their war-time enemy. Europe is making a terrible mistake.

CABLED PARAGRAPHS

Shanghai, Sept. 25.—(By The A. P.)—Charges that papers discovered in the private safe of Dr. Sun Yat-sen, deposed president of South China, after his flight from Canton, revealed that he had been conducting negotiations to "bolehevize" China and bring about a triple alliance of Germany, Russia and China, were denied today by Dr. Sun.

These documents purported to be letters written by Sun Yat-sen to his emissary at Berlin, Chu Wo-chong, revealing an attempt to promote an alliance between China, Germany and the soviet government of Moscow.

AMERICANS ARRESTED FOR SMUGGLING IN GERMANY
Bremerhaven, Germany, Sept. 25.—The captain and first officer of a large American steamship are reported to have been the first victims of a police net spread to catch persons attempting to smuggle valuables out of the country through German ports. It is asserted that the officers were arrested and that they delayed in the sailing of the stamer was prevented only by the local representatives of the ship which it belonged putting up bail for them.

King George may be accompanied with some difficulties.
London, Sept. 25.—(By The A. P.)—Crown Prince George of Greece has indicated his intention to accept the throne, relinquished by his father, according to a message from authoritative sources in Athens.

Now that the cabinet has decided that the abdication of King Constantine will not change the French attitude toward Venizelos, the supporters of Venizelos believe that the former premier would not return except with definite guarantees of certain allied support.

GREEN CROWN PRINCE TOOK OATH AS KING
Paris, Sept. 25.—The Greek crown prince today took the oath as King in the presence of the ministers of the Triantafyllakos cabinet, according to a Hava dispatch from Athens. He assumed the name of George I.
