

ALL TEAMS READY FOR BIG GAMES THIS WEEK END

Everything is all set for the games between the Norwich K. of C. team and the New Haven and Hartford Eastern League teams to be played in this city on Saturday and Sunday coming.

On Thursday Manager O'Leary of the Kaceys received word from Woodward of the New Haven club, now the Minor League champions, stating that it would be better to use him against Hartford on Sunday rather than against his own teammates on Saturday and Manager O'Leary changing his plans accordingly will now use Fortune of the Springfield Eastern League club against the champions on that date, Woodward to pitch against Hartford here on Sunday.

The New Haven team lineup has already been published and the Kacey lineup will be the same for Saturday as first stated, replacing Fortune for Woodward on the mound.

Saturday's game is sure to be one of the fastest played in Norwich this season as New Haven is composed of players whose hitting ability was shown in the final game against the Baltimore Orioles this week when they staged a ninth inning rally and with the aid of several singles, a double and a home run by Hargrave won the game by a score of 4 to 1.

The Kacey team that will buck this hard hitting team is also composed of hitters many of whom are travelling at a 300 speed, and with Fortune on the mound they will give New Haven plenty of worry before the close of the game.

Manager O'Leary received a communication Thursday from the Hartford manager announcing the lineup of the Capitol city team. The Hartford battery will be Swaney, pitcher and Bradshaw catcher. Swaney has taken part in 23 games this past season and has been pitching for an average of 6.00. Against Swaney the Kaceys are sending in Woodward of the New Haven champions who has played in forty games and has a pitching average of .657.

PETER MANNING DRIVEN BY MURPHY BREAKS WORLD'S TROTTING RECORD

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 28.—(By the A. P.)—Peter Manning, driven by Tommy Murphy, today not only lowered his record of 1:57 3-4 in a trial against time but also broke the world trotting record and reduced the trotting record of the Columbus driving park track, which until today stood at 1:59 1-4. His time for the mile was 1:57. The former world's record, held by Peter Manning, was 1:57 3-4.

Paced by a runner, Peter Manning went to the quarter in 29 1-2, to the half in 58 3-4 and to the three quarters in 1:27 1-2. Just before he reached the wire he went into a break, thus possibly slowing down his time. The record performance of the trotter was practically the only feature of today's Grand Circuit races. In addition to driving the fastest trotting mile on record, Murphy was behind two winners in two other events. He drove Margaret Dillon to a straight victory in the William \$3,000 stake for 2:03 pacers. She outclassed the field and paced the middle mile in 2:00 1-4.

Plain Mac, second choice in the first division of the 2:18 trot, was driven by Murphy to another straight heat victory, noosing out Bingle, the favorite in each mile. Peter Manning was paced only by a runner hitched to another sulky. Dillon's mark of 1:54 1-4 made at Lexington in 1913 is not regarded as an official record for the reason that a runner was hitched with him. 2:18 trot, 3 heats, purse \$1,000, 1st division: Plain Mac, bg, by Count Dash-

ONLY FOUR STARS SURVIVE GOLF PLAY

White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Sept. 28.—From among these stars of the links, Miss Glenn Collet, Providence; Miss Edith Cummings, Ontario; Mrs. H. Arnold Jackson, of Greenwich; and Mrs. William A. Gavnin, England's lone survivor, will be chosen the next American woman golfing champion. They enter the semi-finals of the women's tournament tomorrow over the green brier course here.

In matches which furnished a succession of thrills and which, with few exceptions, were brilliantly played on each end, the four premier golfers demonstrated today that they were of championship calibre. Mrs. Jackson, twice has held the American national title. She won the championship in 1909 and repeated in 1914.

Miss Collett is the present eastern title holder. Mrs. Gavnin holds the Canadian championship and has been champion of the metropolitan district three times. She was runner-up in 1913 when Miss Alexa Stirling, whom she eliminated today, won the American crown. Miss Cummings, the slight Chicago girl, won the Buffalo and Shennecosset tournaments.

The match between Mrs. Gavnin and Miss Stirling, won by the English player after a sensational finish by only one hole, gave her the deciding element of three contests. Interest centered in that contest today, and the gallery was rewarded for its long vigil by a decision on the last green.

Miss Collett continued her remarkable golf which gave her the low qualifying medal, although she got off a bad start. She straightened away quickly, however, and finished her
