DANIELSON

WOMAN CHARGED WITH MURDER OF HER NEW-BORN INFANT

(Special to The Bulletin.) Putnam, Oct. 6.—Mary Eitelman of Willimantic was indicted for murder in the first degree when a grand jury in the superior court here returned a true bill against her Friday just after the noon hour. The grand jury's deliberations and consideration of the evidence occupied a little less than an hour. It was said that only three witnesses were heard in addition to considering the charges preferred by the attorney for the state.

Attorney Harry E. Back of Danielson, the lawyer member of the grand jury, was selected by its members to act as foreman and made the report on its findings to the court. The grand jurors, who had been charged at length as to their duties by Judge John W. Banks, who also explained the law as to determining the degree of murder, was thanked by the court and discharged after its finding had been presented.

The accused is charged with having caused the death on April 27, this year, of her new-born infant at her boarding place in Willimantic, where she had been employed in a mill. Coroner Arthur G. Bill of Danielson investigated the case and after due process of law the woman was committed to the county jail at Brooklyn, where in default of bail, she has since remained. Attorney C. L. Torrey of this city, as public defender, is her counsel.

No date has been set for the trial. There was a suggestion Friday that attorneys may be called in to determine Miss Eitelman's mental condition, which is said not to be strong. The grand jury was made up of the following men: Fred W. Wright, Ashford; Frank D. Spalding, Jr., Brooklyn; Levi N. Clark, Canterbury; James Lewis, Chaplin; Arthur M. Keith, Eastford; Fred H. Kober, Sterling; Thomas Ryan, Thompson; Marcus A. Covell, Thompson; S. Arnold Peckham, Windham; Charles R. Hibberd, Windham; Clarence H. Child, Woodstock.

Alphonse Dextrax of Moosup was sentenced Friday morning by Judge Banks to the state reformatory at Chelsea after Dextrax had pleaded guilty to breaking and entering a pool room at Moosup on April 10th of this year and stealing eight boxes of cigars, a quantity of cigarettes and about 100 pennies, his total being valued at \$40. Dextrax gained entrance to the building where he did the thieving through a window. He was not apprehended until July last, by which time responsibility for the crime had been fixed upon him.

Dextrax was first put to plea last Tuesday. At that time he pleaded not guilty. Later agreed with his counsel to change the plea to guilty, but balked and asked to be tried. Trial of the case was begun Friday morning, but had proceeded only a few minutes when Alf Torrey, C. L. Torrey, representing Dextrax held conference with State Attorney Charles E. Searis, the outcome of this conference being the announcement to the court that Dextrax was ready to plead guilty, which he did.

The Dextrax case was heard before a jury. State Attorney Searis informed the court that, with permission, he would make the case of the state vs John Hodiek of Willimantic, charged with deserting his wife and co-habiting with another woman. Mr. Searis explained to the court that he felt an injustice would be done the accused by proceeding with the case, which was nolle.

The jury was discharged until Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, when another matter on the criminal list will come up for trial.

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
