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MAJOR COURSES IN SATURDAY'S FOOTBALL ON EASTERN GRIDIRONS

New York, Oct. 29.—Two sensational upsets—Princeton's shocking defeat of Chicago, 21 to 18, and Pennsylvania's brilliant triumph over the powerful Navy eleven, 13 to 7—were the high spots in Saturday's football program, the most colorful and spectacular on the gridiron so far this season.

Yale and Army Tie Sharing the limelight, in the east, with these two reversals were the battle between Yale and the Army to a 7-7 tie before a vast throng of 76,000 in the 70 bowl at Harvard's Harvard Stadium.

Notre Dame Wins In a contest rivaling the Princeton-Chicago game in inter-sectional interest, Notre Dame invaded Atlanta and trounced Georgia Tech 13 to 3, while in other outstanding encounters, in the west, Michigan gained its second straight conference conquest, a 24-0 victory over Dartmouth, 12 to 2, and a scoreless tie between Penn State and Syracuse at the Polo Grounds.

Football Proving Popular Proof of the remarkable growth of popularity in football, the fact that approximately 231,000 persons witnessed five of the day's leading encounters. Headed by the crowd in Yale bowl, the list showed 53,000 at the Harvard-Dartmouth contest, 50,000 at the dedication of the new Franklin field stadium, where Penn and Navy clashed, 32,000 at the Chicago-Princeton game, and 20,000 at the Penn State-Syracuse games.

Penn Plays Great Football! Princeton and Penn came from behind to score triumphs. The Green Tiger team, fighting to avenge a 9-0 set-back administered by Stagg's eleven a year ago, staged a furious rally in the final quarter.

Yale-Army Even Match The Yale-Army contest was a struggle between two evenly matched eleven, which after a hard-fought and decisive scoring factor, after stonewall defensive work blocked score of the old-fashioned style of attack Yale's spectacular aerial maneuvers.

Penn State a Disappointment Penn State's inability to score against Syracuse was a disappointment to followers of the Nittany Lions, who had hoped for a victory in the Dartmouth line. The Crimson resorted to drop-kicking and scored twice by this route, after several failures while Neidinger, Hanover tackle, saved the game for the Nittany boys by booting a rifle-like shot between the cross-bars from the 48 yard mark.

Other Contests In other outstanding eastern games, Pittsburg was barely able to down the husky Bucknell eleven, 7 to 0; Lafayette's six victories in the 1922 season over Boston college; Holy Cross captured a hard-fought encounter with Vermont, Dartmouth's conqueror, 6-0; and Williams furnished something of an upset by defeating Columbia, 13-10, scoring a touchdown in the final minute of play.

Other inter-sectional resulted in a 7 to 0 victory for Oberlin over Amherst; six victories for Spring College (Mass.) college over Detroit university; and West Virginia's 25 to 0 triumph over Rutgers.

Colgate ran up 82 points to Susquehanna's six, the highest score of the day among larger colleges, while Covington, flashy Centre college quarterback furnished the individual feature by drop-kicking six field goals against Louisville, which lost to the Danville collegians, 22 to 7. Covington's mark is one less than the record of seven field goals in a single game made in 1907 by C. Robert Cross of Purdue in a contest with Rose Polytechnic. Walter Eckersall, old Chicago star, twice booted five field goals in a single game while Traford, of Harvard performed the feat once.
