



WESTERLY

The members of the Westerly Tuberculosis association are to have a campaign which will open Dec. 1 for one week. There will be a particularly interesting display of posters made and designed by the students of the local schools. Miss Sumner, who is the health worker here, held a modern health crusade this week at the West Broad street school and nearly all the students enrolled. Health talks were given and the pupils will have the rank of scouts, knights, knight bannerets, etc. These various ranks will be given to those who fulfill the regulations for a indefinite period. These rules for health are graded according to the age of the pupil. There will be personal hygiene for the small children, including sitting posture, standing and cleanliness.

The older pupils are given instruction in general neatness, keeping their teeth brushed, neatness of person and keeping the surroundings about their homes sanitary, good ventilation, to be clean minded and cheerful at all times not to do anything to harm the health of others, and to have a balanced diet eliminating tea and coffee and not to use narcotics, etc. All this work comes under the tuberculosis committee of the Westerly Visiting Nurse association. An interesting program is planned for the first week in December. The new 1922 Christmas seals for Westerly are much prettier design than the 1921 issue, and they will be distributed early next month. The background of the stamp is light blue, with a yellow figure. The work of the Westerly High school students with the excellent designs, which are original, on the handsome posters they have made and painted show great skill and much deep thought and have most appropriate sayings. These will be on exhibition at the rooms during the campaign. Large Christmas posters will adorn the walls. The posters will be in bright colors with Old Santa with his merry smile, pointing to the seal of the tuberculosis association on the back of an envelope which leaves quite an impression on one's mind of the great work that is being done.
