FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

SAURDAY'S MARKET. New York, Nov. 18.—Trading in today's brief session of the stock market was dull and irregular, closing prices generally being slightly higher than last night's final figures.

Absence of a large number of floor traders, who had been responsible for much of the recent activity, accounted for the apparent lack of interest. Professional interests, uncovered a few weak spots in their campaign of experimental short selling, but the volume of stocks brought out one the reactions was not large.

Pressure was directed principally against International Harvester, of 3-1 points; Pierce Arrow preferred, off 1-1/2; Consolidated Gas and Matheson, each off 1-1/2 and Louisville, Nashville, off 1-3/4, while losses of 2 to 5 points of very small turnovers took place in American Sumatra Tobacco, Quaker Oats, American Southern, Chicago & Eastern Illinois preferred, May Department Stores, Pittsburgh & West Virginia, and South Porto Rico Sugar preferred.

Steel shares give a good example of conflicting price movements, crucible being 1/8, and U. S. Steel common, Gulf States and Republic, fractionally, while Republic dropped a point and Bethlehem B and Vanadium yielded slightly.

Some of the strong spots were Northern Pacific, Continental Can, Cive Cola, American Tobacco A and B, Associated Dry Goods, Marine preferred, American Ship Commerce, Burns Bros. A, Mexican Petroleum, Kresge, Harborside, A. Fisher Body, Freeport Texas, General American Tank, Public Service of New Jersey, United Retail Stores and Western Pacific preferred, the gains ranging from 1 to nearly 5 points.

Total sales were 262,000 shares. Foreign exchanges were nominally lower.

The clearing house statement showed an increase of \$5,577,000 in loans, discounts and investments and decrease of \$1,857,000 in cash, \$55,499,000 in the Federal Reserve Bank, \$1,300,000 in net demand deposits and \$1,616,000 in time deposits. Aggregate reserve was \$488,952,000, leaving a deficit in reserve of \$19,842,000 as compared with an increase in excess reserve of \$38,583,700 last week.
