

SUB BASE ALL-HARFORD TEAMS PLAY TO A 6 TO 6 TIE IN BASE GAME

In a game where more gains were made through penalties than through straight football the Submarine Base team and the All-Harford team fought to a 6 to 6 tie Thursday afternoon on the Sub Base grounds.

The All-Harford team played a strong game and would have been an easy winner for the Navy had the sailors been playing their regular brand of football.
