New York, Dec. 1.—The bond market moved up through practically the entire day today with marked strength exhibited by South American issues and the domestic speculative bonds.

Rio Grande De Sul 8's with 2 3/8 points and Sao Paulo 8's with 1 1/2 points advanced were the outstanding features in the foreign list.

In the speculative railroad mortgages St. Paul general 4's realized 3 1/2 points and Chicago and North Western general 4's, two points each and Erie Consolidated 4's, 1 1/4 points.

Cerro De Pasco 5's advanced 4 3/4 points and Chile Copper 7's two points in sympathy with the rise in stock prices.

Other strong spots in the industrial and public utility list were General Electric 5's, Computing Tabulating and Recording 4's, Manhattan Elevated 4's and Pacific Coast 4's.

The best buying power in the railroad mortgage group was shown in St. Paul convertible 5's, Baltimore and Ohio gold 5's, New York Central 4's of 1921, Denver and Rio Grande 5's, and Kansas City Southern 5's with advances of 1 1/2 to 2 points.

Liberty issues were stronger with gains ranging from four to 30 cents on \$100.
