supply urgent demands. Putnam's monthly quota under what may be termed the rationing plan now in force in the state is 900 tons monthly. Somewhat less than this was received in October and slightly more than that amount in November. The December receipts possibly will be 900 tons. Fuel Administrator Charles E. Dean said Friday that no abuse of the restrictive orders have been called to his attention and that the coal dealers are co-operating with him in seeking an equitable distribution of the coal as it comes in. There is no acute shortage in this city.
