

PROTEST REINSTATEMENT OF ARBUCKLE

Washington, Dec. 21.—A telegram protesting against the granting of permission to Roscoe C. Arbuckle to resume work in motion pictures was sent by the headquarters staff of the National Education association today to Will H. Hays, of the motion picture producers and distributors of America. The telegram asks that Mr. Hays reopen the case of Arbuckle, who has been barred from the screen since he was acquitted of charges brought against him after the death of Virginia Rappe, and that the movie arbiter reconsider his "decision of clemency."
