OHIO.

This State has gone for the opposition by a majority much larger than that given to CHASE for Governor, a year ago. The Abolitionists estimate their majority at 30,000 to 40,000. The Cincinnati Enquirer thinks it may fall.

The Democrats have undoubtedly elected Congressmen in the following Districts, viz: First District—George H. Pendleton; Second District—Wm. S. Growbeck; Sixth District—J. C. Cockerill; Twelfth District—S. S. Cox; Tenth District—Joseph Miller.

These are all gains. In addition to these the Enquirer thinks the chances are favorable for the election of Egan, in the Fifth District; HALL, in the Seventh; MERRILL, in the Eleventh; LAWRENCE, in the Nineteenth; and BEERS in the Fifteenth.

The contest between CAMPBELL and VALLEY BOGARD, in the Dayton District, is so close that the result is still in doubt—with the chances in favor of CAMPBELL.

The gains in Ohio and in this State, will redress the House of Representatives from the hands of the Black Republicans.

If the Democracy of Ohio could have defeated L. D. CAMPBELL, as they have defeated GALLOWAY, of the Columbus District, it would have been a victory of which they might well be proud.

Freedom of Speech. JAMES B. CLAY, of Kentucky, addressed the merchants of Philadelphia, in National Hall, on the evening of the 4th inst. In the course of his speech Mr. CLAY read a letter he received at his house in Kentucky, post-marked at Philadelphia, Sept. 18, and threatening him with death if he dared to speak in that city.

Black Republican Ruffians.—Senator DOUGLASS addressed a large assembly of the Democracy at Belleville, Ill., on the 4th inst. He received, on stepping from the cars, by a large delegation of Democrats, who escorted him to a hotel, where he retired for the evening.
