River and Weather. Saturday was a continuation of the heated term, the mercury ranging at 90 degrees at noon, with a bright burning sun and but little air. The river had fallen 5 inches during the 24 hours ending at noon on Saturday.

Arrivals and Departures. The arrivals and departures up to 3 o'clock Saturday were the Phantom, Cairo and return; Ada Lyon and James Gray, Green River and return; Tarascon and Mary Ament, to Louisville.

Boats Due. Among the first boats due here are the Tahlequah, to Nashville; Nightingale and Yorktown, from St. Louis; Harry Dean and Golden Eagle, for Memphis; J. R. Gilmore, for Arkansas River; Armadillo, Melnotte, and Nick Longworth, New Orleans; Louisville, and Indiana, from New Orleans; Tarascon and Mary Ament, from Louisville.

Miscellaneous. For the number of boats in port, Saturday, business was pretty good for the dull season. The Phantom came in with a moderate trip just after midnight of Friday. She had registered on her up trip over 125 passengers. She was receiving a fair trip for her return, and had arrangements for 40 hogheads of tobacco at Henderson for shipment to New Orleans.

The Ada Lyon, Jas. Gray and Newsboy had each good trips of tobacco. A little craft named Crane, with unremembered initials, passed down without landing. She was about the proper size for a Louisville and Madison or Carrollton packet.

The Tarascon and Mary Ament went out with but little freight. The Tarascon had a vast crowd of people, having added a large number to her excursion party. We understand that Captain Hodge Brown has decided not to go into the Tennessee River trade with the J. P. Webb. The machinery of the Jacob Strader is to be used in the new boat being built by Capt. J. Stent Neal at Madison.

Boats Leaving To-Day. FOR LOUISVILLE.—The fast and elegant J. T. McCombs, Capt. Ed. Crider with the affable and accomplished Miles D. Warren in the office, goes to Louisville at 9 o'clock this morning. She has first class accommodations.

The swift-winged Liberty No. 2, Captain Sam Archer, goes to Louisville at noon today, and is unsurpassable in her fine accommodations.

Cleanings from Our Exchanges. CINCINNATI.—The Commercial of Friday says: The Weather was clear and warm yesterday. At Pittsburg the river is falling, with 4 1/2 feet in the channel. The Kansas is falling, with 3 feet 5 inches in the channel. At this point the river is receding very slowly, with 6 feet on the shoals and 4 feet in the falls. 1/2 feet in the canal and 3 feet on the falls. LOUISVILLE.—The Courier, of Friday, says: The River was falling rather fast yesterday, with 4 feet 2 inches water in the canal in the evening. During the previous twenty-four hours it had fallen three inches at the head of the falls, and nine inches at Portland. The weather was clear and warm, the thermometer ranging from 85 to 88 in the shade, and the atmosphere oppressive.

On the fact that the river was twenty-six inches water in the pass, down the Indian chute, and falling. The Gipsy takes the Strader, the one famous low-pressure millboat, and the fastest boat afloat, to Madison, where she is to be dismantled.

The Morning Star was due from Nashville last evening, and was met by the engine, and is running with half a wheel.

When did the Morning Star go into the Nashville trade, Courier? We presume you mean the Mercury.

PERSONAL.—Constantine Miller, the veteran river reporter of the Cincinnati Commercial, accompanied by Captain Frank Batchelor and their respective families, leaves on a tour to Lake Superior the first of next week.

ST. LOUIS.—The Democrat of Friday says: The river is stationary. A rapid decline to six feet in the channel is looked for. The Missouri is declining, with six feet to Omaha. There is in the Upper Mississippi to Kookuk five and a half feet of water in the channel; it declines thirteen inches since Saturday last, and is now going down steadily. At St. Paul, or rather on the bars near that town, there is less than three feet of water, which excludes the big boats from navigation. The Illinois is in the last stage of decline, with only twenty-six inches between Pekin and Peoria, and thirty inches on the Naples flats.

A Cairo dispatch to the Democrat says: A coal barge towed by the steamer Missionary from Johnsonville to Hickman, containing 1,200 bars railroad iron and two cars, sunk at the foot of Eddy Street at Hickman in thirty feet of water. The Missionary had delivered the barge to the consignees two days previously.

MEMPHIS.—The Appeal, of Wednesday, says: Yesterday was hot and sultry, and by far the hottest day we have ever seen upon the levee. The arrivals and departures were unusually small, and for the first time during the season there was not a boat left in port last evening. The river still rising steadily at this point, and since our last report has risen two inches. Capts. Ed. Hart and J. B. Archer have by mutual consent, dissolved the copartnership heretofore existing between them, and divided their stock as follows: Captain Hart retains the Commercial, St. Patrick, and the new boat on the docks at Louisville, and Capt. Archer the Liberty, Laura Fenner and Tiber. All the boats will be continued in the trades where they are now running.
