

A Letter from Mr. Shanklin. FRANKFORT, Ky., July 12, 1866. Editors Journal:

In your issue of the 10th inst., I find that you have copied a letter from myself, to a Committee of Conservative Union men, expressing my sympathy with the Union men of Kentucky, in their contest with the Breckinridge or secession Democracy of the State, with not very complimentary comments thereon.

I should not notice anything which you have been pleased to say about me, were it not that my home is in Evansville, and as "its people are my people," I do not wish to be misrepresented, even by an editor, who (pardon bluntness,) was never known to state the true position of a political opponent, or deal fairly and candidly with an opposing political organization.

It is not to be expected, of course, that a Radical newspaper is the proper authority for one to consult, in order to establish the complexion of Democracy, consequently, you may understand, that for this reason, your paper has never been regarded as a fit medium for the dissemination of Democratic views. When, therefore, you combat the proposition made by myself, that "the mass of the Indiana Democracy" sympathize with the Union Democracy of Kentucky by the bold and unwarranted assertion that Indiana Democrats are in sympathy with the returned secessionists of this State, you doubtless give great comfort to your Radical readers, who wish from their hearts that such was the case, but I fancy will hardly succeed in convincing a Union Democrat that he must consult the columns of the JOURNAL in order to ascertain his political status.

Before closing this letter, I hope you will allow me to state the political situation in Kentucky, because I see you are either laboring under a mistake as to the real issue, or for party purposes are willfully misrepresenting it; and being charitably inclined, I prefer to ascribe your espousal of Hobson's cause to ignorance—even you, gentlemen, will not lay claim to infallibility.

gress. Secondly, there are not five hundred in the entire State who favor negro suffrage or negro equality. And the smallest editor of your paper could hold out at arm's length every pound of mortality in the State that favors the elimination of State lines.

To substantiate the first proposition, I refer you to Messrs. Rousseau, Green Clay Smith and Randall, members of Congress. For the truth of the second proposition, please see the platform of the 30th May Convention, and to ascertain the correctness of the third proposition, ask every Kentuckian you may meet. When the 1st of May Convention brought out Judge Duval, who has never denied sympathy with the rebellion, and who still, notwithstanding the decision of arms, advocates the right of secession, the Union men of the State classified according to Northern party lines, as follows: Two-thirds, Conservative Democrats, who supported the Chicago nominees, and one-third Conservative Republican who favored the ratification of the Constitutional Amendment abolishing slavery, put in nomination Gen. Hobson, a gentleman, who, with the threat of dismissal from service if he voted against Lincoln hanging over him, cast his vote for McClellan and Pendleton, and whose democracy will, therefore, hardly be questioned. The nomination of Duval was a direct challenge from the Breckinridge or secession Democracy, to renew the contest of '61, and the Conservative Union men, regardless of past petty differences, (and the difference between Conservative Democrats and Conservative Republicans in this State has only been upon questions affecting local politics), united upon Hobson, a supporter of Mr. Douglas in '60, thus, in reality, narrowing the contest down to a struggle between Douglas and Breckinridge Democracy.

The race, then, is not between a Radical—according to the Northern acceptance of that term—and a Democrat, but between a Douglas Democrat and a Breckinridge Democrat—between Union Democracy and Secession Democracy. You are, therefore, supporting a Douglas Democrat—a gentleman who has always voted the Democratic ticket, and whose Democracy is as unquestionable as that of any of the leaders of the party in Indiana. You have pledged yourself "to second every blow" struck in his behalf, and to be consistent, must indorse those gentlemen who have taken the stump for him, every one of whom, save Hon. Curtis F. Burnham, is a Conservative Democrat, in favor of President Johnson's policy, and all of whom, Mr. Burnham included, if I have been correctly advised, cordially indorse the platform of the Congressional Convention lately held at New Albany, and the able and eloquent speech of Hon. Dan. Voorhees in its behalf.

You indorse the conservative orators, and they indorse Mr. Voorhees, therefore you indirectly indorse "the tall sycamore of the Wabash." I really, "did not anticipate an indorsement" of the champion of the Democracy of Indiana, and the prospective Democratic candidate for the United States Senate, from the JOURNAL "so early in the campaign."

In conclusion, I hope, when some of the orators, at present stamping for Hobson, come to Indiana to work for General Manson, you will remember that they are the men whose "blows" you "seconded," and over whose success you "rejoiced," and whatever influence the JOURNAL may wield, will be exerted in favor of the success of Manson.
