RIVER NEWS.

River and Weather. Yesterday was close, hot, and cloudy, little breeze stirring. The river has commenced rising at this place. Up to 3 o'clock, yesterday, it had risen fully 12 inches, and was still rising.

Arrivals and Departures. There were few arrivals and departures up to the time of making up this report. The following constitute the number: Armada, Cairo to Evansville and return; Newsboy, Evansville to Henderson and return; and Nashville, Cairo to Evansville and return.

Boats Due. Among the first boats due here we notice: Maggie Hays, Cincinnati to New Orleans; Lady Franklin and Waunita, from St. Louis; Armadillo, Argosy, P. W. Strader, and Nightingale, St. Louis to Cincinnati; Harry Dean, Memphis to Cincinnati; R. C. Gray and Darling, Cincinnati to Memphis.

Miscellaneous. Business was a little better on the levee yesterday, a considerable amount of freight having arrived. Shipments were also better. The work has again been commenced on the wharf, and will now be pushed forward with the greatest rapidity.

The Nashville brought a good trip of freight and a big lot of people. She also had an excellent return trip, having about a load, with engagements below for a large lot of freight.

The Armada brought about 50 hogheads of tobacco for different parties. She had an excellent trip of people, and a good lot of miscellaneous freight. She also had an excellent return trip.

The Newsboy had a good trip, and brought a lot of tobacco. We are informed that the Mary Ament is about to enter the trade hence to Louisville again. We did not learn how soon she would be put in—probably in a few days.

The P. W. Strader has returned from Cairo to New Orleans, in consequence of the low water. Capt. Stapler, at Elizabeth, above Pittsburg, is building a boat for Southern waters.

The Louisville papers say that the Pink Varble is soon to be on the track again. She will leave Louisville for the Tennessee river to-day.

The steamboats of the Johnsonville Packet Company were to be sold at St. Louis, on the 25th, at Sheriff's Sale.

The Louisville papers report that the steamer Jenny Lind, which was sunk a few days ago at Bonhome Island, has since been raised and brought to the wharf in that city. She goes on the docks for repairs.

Boats Leaving To-Day. For Louisville.—The Tarascon, an elegant, fast, commodious and pleasant boat, offered by three gentlemen, leaves for Louisville this morning at 9 o'clock.

The Rose Hite takes her departure for the same port at 5 o'clock p. m. She is safe and fast.

For Henderson.—The Phantom is the regular Cairo packet to-day. The will be found fast, safe and agreeable, and her officers the most courteous.

For Henderson.—The Newsboy will make the regular trip to Henderson and return.

Cleanings from our Exchanges. The Cincinnati Commercial of the 26th says: The weather was warm and cloudy yesterday, with several rain-storms during the day.

At Pittsburg the river is rising, with 5 1/2 feet in the channel. The Kanawha is rising, with 4 feet in the channel. Here the river has risen 5 feet during the past 24 hours.

There is a rise of 10 inches in the river, with 22 inches in the pass over the falls. There is 4 feet on the shoalest bars along the Lower Ohio.

The Memphis Appeal of the 24th says: Yesterday was by far the hottest day of the season, the thermometer reaching 100 in the shade. Business was tolerably active in miscellaneous freights.

Here, the river is still receding slowly, and Louisville is declining. The Illinois is very low, with twenty-five inches on the flats. At Pittsburg the river is falling, with two feet in the channel.

At Cincinnati the river is also falling. There is four feet four inches in the canal at Louisville. The Cumberland is about on a stand, with twenty-seven inches on the shoals.

The Lower Ohio is falling, with five feet on the bars. The Arkansas and White Rivers are still receding.

The elegant steamer Lady Gay, of the Telegraph Line, which has recently been refitted, and had the old-fashioned fine boilers substituted for her "infernal machines," will be down this evening, and leave at 5 o'clock for the Crescent City.

Captain Burke and Mr. Tatum are gentlemanly and attentive officers.

The Louisville Courier of the 24th says: The river was rising fast yesterday, with 4 feet 9 inches water in the canal in the evening. During the previous 24 hours it had risen one foot.

The head of the falls and fully three feet at Portland, a rapid rise at this season of the year, though not more than should be expected from the heavy rains.

The weather was rainy again yesterday, with several hard rains, and the thermometer verging on 90° in the shade. During the night previous, one of the heaviest rains fell ever experienced in this latitude.

It poured down in torrents, accompanied with high winds, and the most vivid lightning, causing the thunder to reverberate almost incessantly for a space of an hour or two, and in the sharpest tones at times, and again like a hundred parks of artillery at all once.

CARRYING HEMP.—Some diversity of opinion exists in regard to the requirements of the law in reference to transporting hemp as ballast on freight boats. The following extract from the circular of the Surveyor of Customs in this city appears in sales. Shippers and boatmen are under the impression that loose hemp can be carried in the hold.

The seventh section of the act, for example, entirely prohibits the carrying of loose hemp on such vessels, and permits baled hemp to be carried on the deck or gunwale thereof, when it is properly covered with a tarpaulin, and covered with bagging or a similar fabric.

St. Louis.—The Republican of the 24th says: The decline in the river here is steady. Every indication points to a very low stage of water in all the Western rivers very shortly.

The Missouri is going down steadily. No steamers except those of very light draft are now running in the Illinois, and they all run about light and carry their cargoes in barges.

The upper Mississippi is a great resort for the same class of boats, but the Northern Line Company shrewdly manages to keep several of their boats employed by running them hence to Keokuk, where they reship on others of their vessels.

By this method they are at St. Paul. But it may be expected that in a few days some of these boats and the Keokuk Packet Company's boats will be supplanted by stern-wheelers and barges.
