NEW YORK, Nov. 23, 1845. p. m.—There is no cotton market. Flour began at \$5.75, and is now \$6.25, at which 2000 good Michigan, 2000 Genesee, and various other brands, in all 8,000 or 10,000 lbs., as we judge, are being sold.
