

Letter from Mr. Henry A. Wise.

OLNEY, NEAR ONANOK, Accomack County, Feb. 10, 1848.

GENTLEMEN:—Yours of January 10th, postmarked Jan. 14th, informing me that on the 25th day of the present month...

I am proud to be thus recognized by the democratic party of the State, and am happy to have it in my power publicly to declare...

That the annexation of Texas to the United States was an act moral, rightful and just, justified by the laws of nations, and authorized by the constitution of the United States...

That the war in consequence thereof was wondrously and unnecessarily protracted, and that it was unrighteous and unjust on her part...

That Mexico having, in an authentic diplomatic form, threatened the war, and in fact officially notified the United States through her minister, Almonte...

That Congress, by its own acts, pointed out to the Executive, and designated clearly the limits of Texas, which was clearly defined by the President...

That the war has been prosecuted with unusual moral firmness, and conducted with extraordinary vigor, considering the small regular army of the United States...

That the war has cost too much, it has been overruled by the magnanimity and humane forbearance with which it has been prosecuted in the enemy's country...

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Political Curiosities of the Cabinet of Gen. Taylor.

We call from the Ingersoll letter of General Taylor, which was pronounced "a forgery" by his official organ in New York, the following curiosities:

I was decidedly in favor of Mr. Clay's election, and would not prefer seeing him in that office to any individual in the Union—certainly much more so at any time than myself.

If Gen. Taylor really wrote this, and was sincere in what he said, why does he now say to the Harrisburgh Convention that he is in the field as a candidate, and that his position is "immutable"?

I consider Mr. Clay's views, and those of the whigs, for the most part more nearly assimilated, as regards political matters, to those of Mr. Jefferson, than their opponents...

This is directly contradicted by his letter to the democratic North and Ready Association of New York; for he here leads us to infer that he is well versed in the political tenets of Thomas Jefferson...
