NEW RESIDENCES.—State Treasurer Well is building a fine residence on L street, second lot east of Tenth, and facing the Capitol grounds, at a cost of about \$4,000. He expects to occupy it about the 1st of April. Mr. Meier is also building a handsome residence on the corner lot adjoining, which is to cost about \$4,000. Several fine buildings have been erected in the vicinity of the Capitol during the past year, and preparations are being made for the construction of others during the coming season.

SEWER TO BE BUILT.—At a special meeting of the Board of City Trustees yesterday proposals were received for constructing a sewer in the alley between H and L Third streets and the alley between L and M Third streets for doing the work was awarded to William Suar at \$2 cents per lineal foot for 8-inch iron pipe, 21 cents for 9-inch, 40 cents each for connections, \$3 for each manhole, 50 cents per foot for earth.

DEATH OF AN OLD SACRAMENTO.—In the appropriate place in this morning's RECORD-UNION will be found the announcement of the death of Sanford E. Herrick, in San Francisco, who was an old resident of Sacramento, and who was engaged in the business of doing business for many years on Front street with the late L. F. Reed, and was well known here at that time.

MEETING OF THE BAR.—The members of the Bar held a meeting yesterday for the purpose of adopting a code of rules for the government of the Superior Courts. All discussion was informal, and the committee heretofore appointed, consisting of attorneys Raymond Jones, Armstrong, Catlin and McKune, was given until Saturday to prepare a final report.

THE CITY RAILROAD WAR. Dead Lock Between the Trustees and Railway Company.

ALL CARS WITHDRAWN FROM THE ROAD. Terms Upon Which the O Street Road was Built—The Citizens Propose to Compel the Company to Comply with the Terms of their Contract.

The interest and excitement in reference to the pending contest between the Board of City Trustees and the people upon one side, and the City Railway Company on the other, was not in the least abated yesterday, but assumed a more determined form of complication and resistance between the parties.

The railway company have not run any cars since Monday evening upon either the H, or O street lines, and apparently have adopted this course as a measure of retaliation for the unanimous sentiment of the people against the high-handed procedure of the company. While this course may tend to the convenience of some who would rather not pay the fare, it certainly will not win friends nor sympathy for the company, nor for the position it has assumed.

Yesterday morning the railway company, accompanied by Charles Hayward and his counsel, called upon the Board of Trustees with a view to effecting a compromise, but the Board of Trustees refused to grant any concessions. Upon a statement of the matter by the Board, Mr. Fritchard's counsel advised him to pay the full amount of the mortgage, and to let the matter rest there.

It is stated by the leading subscribers to this fund that in 1875, when the project of building a line out of O street had been talked of by the owners of the H street railway and nearly abandoned, the trustees of that such a road would be to the residents along its proposed route induced the property owners along O street and thereupon began to subscribe the necessary amount to secure the building of the road.

This agreement, made and entered into this 15th day of January, 1875, between the City of Sacramento City Railway Company, a corporation formed and organized in California, party of the first part, and the undersigned persons, whose names are hereto subscribed, parties of the second part, is as follows: That, whereas, the party of the first part has proposed to build a street railway from the corner of O street and Main street to the corner of O street and Tenth street, and to operate the same, over the route and manner hereinafter specified, and whereas the party of the second part, who are desirous of having said road built and operated; Now, therefore, we agree, that, in consideration of the sum of \$20,000, in cash, on demand as follows: Ten per cent upon commencement of the work, and the balance soon after, and that the party of the second part shall have, and shall place in good running order, a local street railway most conveniently situated, and of the length of the line, from K street to O street, and thence on O to Tenth street, and thence on Tenth to P street.

And, whereas, the party of the second part, who are desirous of having said road built and operated; Now, therefore, we agree, that, in consideration of the sum of \$20,000, in cash, on demand as follows: Ten per cent upon commencement of the work, and the balance soon after, and that the party of the second part shall have, and shall place in good running order, a local street railway most conveniently situated, and of the length of the line, from K street to O street, and thence on O to Tenth street, and thence on Tenth to P street.
