New York, February 3d.—The severest snow storm of the season occurred to-day, four inches falling on the level, and the heavy wind caused deep drifts.

POUGHKEEPSIE, February 3d.—A heavy snow storm occurred along the Hudson last night.

MANASQUAN (N. J.), February 3d.—The roof of the Manasquan Railroad depot was blown away to-night by the gale.
