

PRESIDENTIAL PREFERENCES.

Who the California Republicans Like to See Elected.

CURRENT OF PUBLIC OPINION.

Blaine First, Grant Second and Washburne Third.

FEELING OF DEMOCRATIC POLITICIANS.

Thurman, Bayard, Seymour, McClellan and Tilden Mentioned.

ONTARIO, February 6th.—A careful canvass of our town to-day, in the brief time allowed, shows the following preferences as first choice for the Presidency on the Republican side: Blaine 73, Grant 55, Washburne 5, Hayes 1, Conkling 1, Sherman none. The Democratic preferences, so far as canvassed, were as follows: Thurman 11, Bayard 9, Seymour 3, McClellan 3, Hendricks 6, Tilden 2. The first choice of ex-Confederate soldiers and Democrats was Grant, and of one old-line Republican, Thurman.

DIXON.—A canvass among Republicans here for Presidential preferences resulted in Blaine 22, Grant 4, Washburne 10, Sherman 1. The Democrats stand as follows: Seymour 41, Thurman 10, Tilden 1. Two Republicans named Thurman as their first choice.

REDFORD CITY.—From interviews with 40 leading Republicans, the following is first choice: Blaine 28, Grant 2, Sherman 4.

MUSKOGEE.—The choice of 80 Republican voters of this town is: For Blaine 62, Grant 12, Washburne 3.

SAN RAFAEL.—Leading Republicans generally seem to be in favor of Grant.

SHERMAN.—Blaine is almost the unanimous choice in this vicinity for the Presidency. Blaine appears to be out of 20 leading Republicans interviewed, only 3 were for Grant, the balance being for Blaine.

DAVENVILLE.—Your correspondent has taken the extension of 23 Republicans as to their Presidential preferences, and find them divided as follows: Blaine 17, Grant 3, Sherman 3, Washburne 1.

WAXBURGH.—So far as interviewed, 3 out of every 4 Republicans are in favor of Grant's nomination.

FERRIS.—Thirty prominent Republicans were interviewed to-day on the Presidential question, with the results as follows: Grant 14, Blaine 5, Butler 1, Conkling 1, Sherman 2, Thurman 3, non-committal 4.

ERRERA.—A canvass of the "siding Republicans of Errera was made to-day on a Presidential question. Taken from the record that Blaine, Grant, Sherman and Garfield were the rising men, from that quartet the leader of the Republican party for 1880 would be selected. 20 Republicans were consulted regarding the first choice, with the following result: Blaine 21, Grant 7, Sherman 4.

SANTA ROSA.—Your correspondent has interviewed many Republicans to-day, with the following result: Blaine 25, Grant 10, Conkling 1, Washburne 5, Garfield 1, don't care a straw 2. The Grant men are for Grant first, last and all the time. The Blaine men say "anything to beat Grant."

ANTIOCH.—A canvass of the town of Antioch gives 51 for Blaine, 3 for Grant, 1 for Hayes and 1 for Sherman.

SALINAS.—Nearly all of the Republicans of this city and vicinity, both radical and conservative, are unqualifiedly in favor of James G. Blaine for President. They are of the opinion that he is the only man the Republicans can nominate that will carry this State. He would get more than a party vote in this town and county. But very few Republicans here favor the nomination of Grant, while the Democrats are urging them to run him, saying he is the strongest man. Blaine's record on the Chinese question will, if he is nominated, get him many votes here from the Workmen. They believe Grant to be stronger on that question.

SIX ANGELES.—As to a choice between Blaine and Grant for the Presidency, the sentiment of a majority of Republicans seem to be in favor of Blaine. This feeling arises more from an impression that he is the strongest man than from any preference.

ANAHIM.—The sentiment of the Republicans here is overwhelmingly in favor of Blaine, and there is no doubt that the same feeling prevails throughout the entire county. Grant is the second choice. Washburne has some adherents. Sherman is nowhere.

COLUMBIA.—By interviewing leading Republicans of this precinct it is ascertained that the preference seems to lean towards Blaine as the nominee for the Presidency.

HEALSBURG.—A large majority prefer Blaine. A few are for Grant and a few for Washburne. The feeling for popular prejudice would be injurious to Grant causes many to prefer Blaine.
