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CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE.

XXIII. SESSION—EIGHTY-SECOND DAY.

The Senate met in regular session at 10 A. M., President Mansfield in the chair. Roll called and a quorum present.

The Journal of yesterday was read and approved. A long discussion arose on a motion to correct the Journal so as to show that Senate Bill No. 276, for the appropriation of \$25,000, had not been read in full a second time.

Mr. Nye, from the Committee on Judiciary, reported back Senate Bill No. 422—An Act to add a new section to the Code of Civil Procedure, to be numbered 1224, relating to the law of evidence.
