SPRINGFIELD (Ill.), April 16th.—The newly-organized Lincoln Guard of Honor held memorial services at the catacomb of the Lincoln monument yesterday morning, in commemoration of the fifteenth anniversary of the death of Abraham Lincoln.

CONKING AND THE PRESIDENCY.

NEW YORK, April 16th.—The Tribune says: The reticence of Senator Conkling has given rise to a rumor in Washington that the nominee Chicago is not Grant Conkling will lend his influence toward throwing away the vote of New York State in order to defeat the candidate. This rumor is regarded as improbable.

A \$25,000 Fire.

CINCINNATI, April 16th.—A fire at Perryville to-day destroyed several buildings and stores. Loss, \$25,000.

Fire at St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, April 16th.—Neulle & Gatal's planing mill, and Fox's sash and door factory, in the southern part of the city, were burned to-day. Loss, \$50,000; insured for \$10,000.

SPRINGFIELD (Ill.), April 16th.—On the request of the local Chicago committee, a gavel was sworn out from Abraham Lincoln's residence has been sent on to make a gavel for the National Convention.

Grant in Arkansas.

LITTLE ROCK, April 16th.—The reception of General Grant here was worthy his reputation. Thousands of persons were massed at the reception grounds, and the enthusiasm was general.

Sherman Delegates in Florida.

KEY WEST (Fla.), April 16th.—In the Monroe County Convention this morning Sherman delegates were elected, and E. L. Ware was nominated for Congress.

Railroad Sold.

COLUMBIA (S. C.), April 16th.—The Greenville and Columbia Railroad was bought by W. A. Courtenay, of Charleston, for \$2,903,400.

The New Jersey Forest Fires.

TOMES RIVER (N. J.), April 16th.—The forest fire is spreading towards Tuckerton beach, and the residence of Judge Jeffrey, one of the finest in the country, has been burned. Four other dwellings are reported destroyed and a farm hand burned to death.

Shot and Killed.

MONTICELLO (Pa.), April 16th.—Last night Fred. Warren shot and instantly killed Mason Wilson. Both were respected married men. Cause unknown. Warren said he had good reason. He fired four shots, two after Wilson fell.

The Strike at Troy.

TROY (N. Y.), April 16th.—The strikers offer to return to work if the Union will be respected, and the owners answer that if the Union is for the support of sick members they may return, but to coerce proprietors the question must be settled now and forever.

Vermont Greenbackers.

WATERBURY, April 16th.—The State Convention of the Greenbackers will be held at Montpelier May 15th.

Addition to the "Conscience Fund."

WASHINGTON, April 16th.—The Secretary of the Treasury has received \$100,000 for the conscience fund from New York, labeled "income tax."

No Yellow Fever at Memphis.

MEMPHIS, April 16th.—Dr. R. W. Mitchell, a recent member of the National Board of Health, has telegraphed the Secretary of the National Board of Health as follows: "A special press dispatch from Washington states that the National Board of Health have an official report of two cases of yellow fever having occurred in Memphis during the month of March. How is it possible, no case has occurred here to this date. Answer at once." Dr. G. B. Thornton, President of the Local Board of Health, in response to a telegram, also says the report is not true, and a case of yellow fever having occurred since last fall.

The Mint at Carson.

WASHINGTON, April 16th.—The Secretary of the Treasury has decided to resume coinage at the Mint at Carson on May 1st, sufficient bullion having been accumulated to justify commencing operations. The Department is in receipt of advices leading to the belief that silver bullion will be delivered at Carson at the price paid in San Francisco. It is understood that since the 1st of July last purchases have been authorized at precisely the same rate at both Mints, but the amount of silver and procured Carson has not been sufficient to keep that Mint in operation. The Department is unwilling to pay more for the silver than at the Carson Mint than is paid in San Francisco.

Double Execution.

ST. LOUIS, April 16th.—Nathan Faucett and Jacob Muldrow, two mulattoes, were hanged at Mexico, Mo., to-day for the murder of Otto Julo, a young man well known in this community, September 30, 1879. The Catholic service was performed by attending priests. The black caps were adjusted at 1:50 and at 2:05 precisely the trap was sprung.

Grant at Cairo.

CAIRO (Ill.), April 16th.—General Grant arrived this afternoon, and was met by a procession of 2,000 persons.

Advance in Wages—Killed in His Own House.

OMAHA, April 16th.—The Union Pacific Railroad Company to-day made an advance of ten per cent. on the wages of its employees at their shops receiving \$5 per day or under.

At Lincoln, early this morning, David Hild, a man who was shot and instantly killed in his home by two drunken men who knocked for admittance, and who, upon opening the door, he ordered away. Both men were soon afterward arrested.

Severest Storm of the Season.

MILWAUKEE, April 16th.—The severest storm of the season visited this State this morning in the northern section. Several inches of snow fell, impeding trains in the vicinity of Oshkosh. No serious disasters are yet reported on the lakes, but it is feared the gale was severe on vessels, and reports of disasters are expected. The tug Caroline Altemus reached port this evening, and after having abandoned the schooner Walter B. Allen after rescuing the crew. The schooner sank soon after between Manitowish and Sheboygan.

Parnell's Election Expenses—The Marlborough Relief Fund.

DUBLIN, April 16th.—A collection will be taken in the chapels in Meath county to-day to defray the election expenses of Parnell.

At a meeting of the Marlborough Relief Committee to-day the Duchess said political events rendered it necessary for her to say farewell to Ireland, and close her immediate connection with the fund. Her proposal to hand over the balance, £18,287, to four trustees was agreed to.

The Army Bill in the German Reichstag.

BERLIN, April 16th.—The army bill has passed to a third reading in the Reichstag by a large majority.

The Religious Question in France—Relief of Irish Distress.

PARIS, April 16th.—Cardinal Guibert, Archbishop of Paris, in his protest against the decrees restricting unauthorized religious congregations, says: "The decrees at present are only a menace, but should they be executed, it is to be feared that they will lead to painful conflicts between law and conscience, and that France may enter upon internal troubles of which no man can foresee the end. A sermon will be preached at the Church of the Madeleine on Sunday next for the relief of the Irish distress. Cardinal Guibert will participate in the ceremony. The offertory will be conducted by the wife of ex-President MacMahon and other distinguished ladies.

Proposed Alteration in the Prussian Constitution.

BERLIN, April 16th.—Prussia has proposed to the Bundesrat certain alterations in the Imperial Constitution, whereby all legislative business must be dealt with in a certain

limited period at the sittings, in which all the representatives of the Federal States will be required to participate, and no proposing restrictions on the right of proxy representation generally. The proposals have been passed upon favorably, and referred to the appropriate committee.

Sudden Death of a Newly-Elected Member of Parliament.

BERMINGHAM, April 16th.—J. S. Wright, who has just been elected a Liberal member of Parliament for Nottingham, fell dead at an educational meeting here to-day.

Anniversary Celebration.

BERLIN, April 16th.—Emperor William, the Princes and several generals, went to Rathenow yesterday to witness the celebration, by the famous Zietar regiment of Hussars, of the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of General Zietar's entrance into that regiment.

A Demand from Russia.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 16th.—The Russian representative here has sent a note to the special order in the House for next Tuesday evening. This bill will be strongly supported by the California delegation, since it answers every purpose of the bill to restrict Chinese immigration now on the calendar.

New German Ambassador—Viewed Unfavorably.

PARIS, April 16th.—Baron von Rodowicz, the new German Ambassador, has arrived. M. Dufaure, in an interview with his colleagues and political friends, deprecated as impertinent the idea of interpellating the Government relative to the decrees against unauthorized congregations. He pointed out that the congregations had had only to have recourse to legal tribunals.

The Cuban Budget.

MADRID, April 16th.—In Congress to-day General Campos appealed to the Government to make various reforms, liberal modifications in the Cuban budget of receipts, but Senator Armas, Cuban Deputy, combated the proposal. He declared that the reforms suggested were impossible, considering the state of labor and the exchequer. Senator Cobarras, another Cuban Deputy, insisted on the necessity of reform in the administration of Cuba. The Official Gazette stated that the floating debt of the Cuban treasury on April 1st amounted to 113,000,000 pesetas.

The Amersham Claimed—Growing Uncertainty.

CARLU, April 16th.—Abdur Rahman Khan is sending letters to all the chiefs claiming the Amersham.

There is a growing uneasiness among the Hindus in Ceylon.

Parnell in Cork.

CORK, April 16th.—The freedom of the city was given Parnell at the Court-house to-day. The building was thronged with a great number of the city corporation were present. The Mayor in his address commented on Parnell's labor in America and his Irish friends.

Gerlachoff's Condition.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 16th.—Although his physician holds out hopes of recovery, Prince Gerlachoff is convinced that he will die, and awaits the end with resignation.

The Kettle's Defeat—Distress Increasing—The Queen's Arrival.

LONDON, April 16th.—Kettle's defeat in Cork county is entirely the work of the clergy.

At a meeting of the Dublin Mansion House Committee to-day, letters were read showing that the distress is increasing. The Lord Mayor said that, former money was not received that would have to appeal to the Government for aid.

The arrival of the Queen a day earlier than was expected will enable her to have an audience Saturday.

The Vote in Cork County, Ireland—Royal Decoration—Bishop Appointed.

LONDON, April 16th.—The vote for members of Parliament in Cork county has been declared as follows: William Shaw, nominal Home Rule leader, re-elected; Colonel David Colthurst, Home Ruler, re-elected. Kettle, the Conservative, was elected.

The Queen has conferred the decoration of Knight of the Grand Cross of the Order of Bath on Sir Stafford Northcote and Lord Manners.

The Queen has appointed Rev. John Colthurst, Bishop of the newly-constituted see of Liverpool.

The Missing Training Ship.

PORTSMOUTH, April 16th.—In beating up from Bermuda against northerly winds, the training ship Albatross, which was on her way to the Gulf stream and to catch the westerly wind which prevails north of the Tropic of Cancer, was missing. The ship Albatross may be compelled to proceed as far north as New York or further. This would retard her progress and prolong her cruise. She is not regarded as a very handy craft, although a safe one.

Incendiarism in Ireland.

DUBLIN, April 16th.—The houses of two Protestant ministers in Connaught County Galway, have been maliciously burned.
