

BLOODSHED.

Charles De Young Shot to Death in His Own Office.

KALLOOH'S SON THE SLAYER.

Five Shots Fired but Only One Takes Effect.

BODY TAKEN TO THE MORGUE.

Procession Composed of a Hooting and Jeering Mob.

PROBABLE CAUSE OF ASSASSINATION.

The Arrest and Incarceration of the Murderer.

(SPECIAL BY TELEGRAPH TO THE RECORD-UNION.)

SAN FRANCISCO, April 23d.—Just before 8 o'clock this evening Charles De Young entered the business office of the Chronicle, on the ground floor, corner of Kearny and Bush streets, and stood talking with some gentlemen, leaning against the counter.

The latter ran through a gate of the counter to the desk inside, where he was waiting for a customer. On reaching the desk De Young turned to face his opponent with a pistol in his hand, when Kallooh, leaning over the counter, fired again, the ball striking De Young in the mouth.

De Young raised his pistol as if to fire, but apparently his strength failed him, for the pistol was not discharged, and sinking backward, he fell on the floor. Dystanston ran to his assistance, but the ball had evidently pierced the base of the brain, and in a few moments he expired.

As Kallooh ran out of the door he was seized by a citizen, and at the same moment an officer came up and took him into custody and conducted him to the city prison, where he was locked up.

NEWS OF THE MURDER. Flew through the city like the wind, and in a few moments the streets in the vicinity of the Chronicle office were crowded with people eager to learn the particulars of the affair.

In the rear office M. H. De Young, brother of deceased, reclined on a lounge, surrounded by friends, evidently overcome by the tragedy, but with dry eyes and a calm though strained voice. He was not present at the time of the shooting, having left home after dinner a few moments later than Charles. Deceased lay on his back on the floor.


ON BEING ARRESTED, was, as the arresting officer remarked, the coolest man he ever saw. He still carried the smoking pistol in his hand, which he surrendered to the officer on his way to the station house.

He observed a strict reticence, and on being shown to his cell positively refused to have any intercourse whatever with representatives of the press. In the absence of any explanations from the assassin of the cause of the act, it is generally understood to be attributable to a pamphlet which has recently been circulated about the city attacking Mayor Kallooh, father of De Young's slayer.

During his recent visit East it is believed that deceased devoted a great deal of attention to gathering up matter regarding the past life of Mayor Kallooh, for the presumed purpose of either using it at the expected trial of deceased on a charge of shooting Kallooh last August, or of making it subservice a journalistic purpose.

The pamphlet above referred to was a document of some thirty pages, and recounted the details of the Kallooh scandal in Boston and other matter of a scandalous nature. The pamphlet was anonymous, but young Kallooh evidently considered that deceased was responsible for its publication, and acted accordingly.

(SECOND DISPATCH.)

The Deed Evidently Deliberate. SAN FRANCISCO, April 23d.—Further inquiry shows that young Kallooh fired five shots at De Young, of which only one—the fourth—took effect. Otherwise the original report of the affair seems to be substantially correct. It is evident that the deed was deliberate. Officer Noyes states that a few moments before De Young entered the office he saw Kallooh walk along Kearny street and peer into the window of the Chronicle counting room. He was evidently on the watch, awaiting the arrival of his victim.

THE BODY TAKEN TO THE MORGUE.

About a quarter past 9 o'clock the Coroner's assistants took the body from where it had been lying on the floor awaiting his examination, and removed it to a wagon for conveyance to the Morgue. The crowd in the meantime had increased to thousands, blocking up both Kearny and Bush streets. It was composed of all classes, evidently including a great many of sand-lot proclivities, and as the body was brought out cheers, howls and ejaculations of exultation and derision arose.

The Coroner's wagon, escorted by a squad of police, drove at once to the Morgue followed by the hooting, whistling and yelling mob. The demonstration was confined merely to words, no action of a violent nature occurring. On arriving at the Morgue the crowd gathered there for a while continued its demonstration, but soon dispersed, and the officers retired.

THE PAMPHLET. Previously referred to proves on examination to be simply a full report of the trial of Rev. I. S. Kallooh in the case of the Boston scandal, with a brief preface, to the effect that it was published with no malicious motive, but simply to give a plain, unvarnished report of the trial. It bore the imprint of Eberstein & Co., Boston, 1857, but is evidently a fresh publication. It seems to be admitted that the document was issued with a view of influencing public opinion in connection with the approaching trial of De Young, and it may perhaps have been further intended to have some bearing upon more immediate issues.

It will be remembered that the Chronicle ratted its office about ten days ago. The Typographical Union and the Amalgamated Trades Union took up the fight for the discharged Chronicle printers, and have placarded the city with appeals to the public to withdraw patronage from the paper, and have published advertisements to the same effect in the interior journals. A mass meeting was advertised for to-morrow evening to denounce the course of the Chronicle, which was to have been addressed by Mayor Kallooh, among others, and it is possible that the publication of the pamphlet was designed to have an effect on the present quarrel as well as on the coming trial of De Young.

It is as yet too early to gauge the general expression of public opinion on the tragedy, but so far as could be gleaned from the talk heard on the street this evening, the rumor seemed to be that the death of De Young at the hands of the son was the legitimate outgrowth of the recent attack of deceased upon his father.

and covered with dust. M. H. De Young was stretched on a lounge in his private office, overcome with horror, but no other relatives of deceased were present.

THE BRUTAL CONDUCT OF THE MOB. In a short time the body was removed from the office by order of the Coroner, and placed in a wagon to be conveyed to the Morgue.

On its appearance at the rear door of the building it was greeted by the crowd with groans, hisses and shouts of derision, and when the wagon started up Kearny street, guarded by a double file of police, it was followed by a jeering crowd of men and boys, who made the night hideous with their yells and groans. Along Kearny street the wagon slowly passed, followed by an increasing throng, among whom it was easy to see were many of the sand-lot crowd, and from them almost exclusively came the brutal expressions so shocking to the moral sense of every decent spectator.

As the wagon turned into Market street a rush by the crowd, seemingly directed toward the wagon, called for the interference of the police, and the latter, by a free use of their clubs, drove back the hooting mass. After this no further demonstration occurred, and the body was peacefully conveyed to the Coroner's office, where the remains will await the autopsy and inquest, which will take place to-morrow.

No further examination of the body was made than just enough to ascertain that only one shot took effect. The ball struck him in the face, about half an inch to the right of the extremity of the nose, and ranging upward buried itself in the base of the brain, causing death in a few seconds.

ON THE STREET. The affair is discussed by excited crowds. All the newspaper offices are surrounded by dense masses of people, and everywhere the shooting is the theme of conversation. Though taking everybody by surprise, the affair is regarded as but another instance of the tragedy that began with the war between De Young and Mayor Kallooh, and produced the strouc scenes of last fall.

Rev. I. M. Kallooh. The slayer of Charles De Young, is a young man, probably about 28 or 30 years of age. He was born in Massachusetts, and his education was finished at the Vacaville College, California. He was some five years ago admitted to the ministry in the Baptist Church. He was for a brief time stationed as pastor of Calvary Church, Sacramento, and subsequently had pastorates in coast counties north of San Francisco. Latterly he was installed assistant pastor at his father's church, San Francisco. He also holds a position in his father's office at the City Hall. He is tall and slender and bears but little resemblance to his father. He is of quiet demeanor, rather austere, and not of that countenance which invites cordiality. He is very slow of speech and deliberate in his utterances. He impresses one as a man of strong convictions and determined purposes, one rather slow to anger, but when aroused cool in manifestations of passion. He is the kind of a man who apparently is of a very sensitive and a very proud nature, and who has natural courage and undoubted resolution.

His physical appearance would not indicate that he would be the man to seek personal struggles, or to give or receive vigorous blows, but his countenance speaks of determination in purpose, thoughtful actions, and cool execution of plans once settled upon. He lacks the grace of his father on the rostrum, and his speech is not marked by wit or enlivened by humor, his discourses being, on the contrary, cast in a grave and serious mold.
