The Giant Powder Works at Fleming's Point, near West Berkeley, are being reconstructed. The canyon streams of Utah are beginning to boom and the valleys are threatened with floods.

The Sonoma county treasury paid jurors' fees during the past fifteen months to the amount of \$5,020 25. Judge Warner, of Pilot Hill, El Dorado county, Tuesday found an \$80 nugget under one of his fruit trees.

A Woman's Temperance Society, auxiliary to the National organization of the same character, is being formed in San Jose. Although but 650 votes were cast at the recent city election in Santa Rosa, 24,000 tickets were voted. A traction over 38 tickets to each voter.

David B. James, the inventor of the single-track railway, is in San Diego trying to induce the people of that section to build one of his railways to Yuma. In consequence of the storm and the large amount of snow on pasture lands, several Oakland butchers have advanced the price of beef, mutton and pork.

N. D. Burlingame & Co., of Kelsey, El Dorado county, assayed a few tons of the Mansfield rock one day last week from which they received \$60. It averaged over \$3 per pound. In Napa valley a disease similar to epizootic in a mild form has appeared among the horses, and in other localities they are dying with pneumonia, brought on, it is said, by the protracted wet weather.

Two boys recently killed a wildcat in San Mateo county. Their weapons were sticks, and their aid in the fight their faithful dog. The boys are aged 5 and 9 years respectively, and the cat weighed 16 pounds. Wood is getting to be a very scarce article in Placerville, and neighbors are borrowing and lending to bridge the chasm, while some are raking up all the old available rubbish, boxes, barrels, etc., to keep their stoves warm.

There are over 1,500 stands of bees on the Trabcos, Los Angeles, and taking an average of 100 pounds to the stand, and not counting anything from the increase, the apiculturists of that place will have 150,000 pounds of honey to sell. Were it not for the narrow-gauge railroad, there would be a wood famine in Nevada City at present. For many weeks the wagon roads have been in such a condition as to prevent the removal of lumber from transporting fuel from the forests.

A dispatch was received at Grass Valley from Iowa Hill, Placer county, Tuesday afternoon, announcing that Peter James had just been killed in the North Star hydraulic claim at the disposal of the school. His death was caused by his being washed through a cut in the claim. The railroad company have purchased 7,000 acres of land near the site of their new hotel at Monterey. The company will, it is understood, make this immense tract into a beautiful and picturesque park, to complete which they will turn the Carmel river into the park itself. The opinion of those who have recently visited Monterey is that when the changes now in progress are finished, it will be one of the prettiest and most inviting watering-places on the continent.

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Justice of the Peace Burke yesterday gave judgment for plaintiff in the sum of \$200 in the case of John Missigill vs. the Geary-street Railroad. This action was based on Section 505 of the Civil Code, requiring that every passenger must be provided on request, to any passenger desiring them, any required quantity of tickets, a failure to do so entailing a forfeiture of \$200. In rendering judgment, Judge Burke held that notice referred to was mandatory, and the plaintiff's motives in bringing the action could not be considered by him.

Pursuant to an order of the Superior Court, Superintendent Provost, of the Honorable Correction turned over Dennis Kearney to the custody of the Sheriff, who is ordered to produce him in Department No. 1 of the Superior Court at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, when the writ of habeas corpus is to be heard. The Sheriff has five Superior Judges in bank, Kearney was, at 2:30 o'clock, at the office of the Sheriff, in whose custody he now is. The Judges sitting in bank to hear the case will be Judges Dampierfeld, Evans, Hunt, Sullivan and Ferris.

A few weeks ago, the romantic marriage of a wealthy young lady of this city to a poor but respectable and intelligent young man employed by the California-street Railroad Company, as car conductor, created a stir in local society circles. The affair had a pleasant ending, the young lady's folks very sensibly taking her husband affectionately into the family when it was found that his only social shortcoming was poverty. The latest news from the circles relates to the elopement and marriage of the only daughter of an Oakland millionaire with a poverty-stricken, but well-educated, intelligent, temperate young man, who was in his late 20's. The young couple waited some time for the repentance of the father, who in his indignation, promptly disinherited his daughter; but not repenting, the latter abandoned her husband, at the expiration of a year, returned to the parental roof. The elopement and marriage, it is reported, occurred several weeks ago.
