Naval Station on the Northwestern Coast. WASHINGTON, April 28th.—The Home Naval Committee agreed to-day to report favorably Representative Whittaker's bill, providing for a station on the northwest coast for a naval station.

United States Officials as Presidential Electors. WASHINGTON, April 28th.—Senator Morgan introduced a bill to-day, providing that no member of Congress or United States official should be eligible for elector, or in any way be connected with the duties of that position, under a penalty of personal disqualification as a Government official and a fine of from \$500 to \$2,000.

The Postmaster-Generalship. NEW YORK, April 28th.—A. M. The Times' Washington special says: A strong movement is on foot, which has taken definite shape, to place Postmaster James, of New York, in Postmaster-General's place.

Attempt of an Insane Murderer to Kill His Child. ASTORIA (Tex.), April 28th.—Mrs. Honston, living in the country, yesterday, in a fit of insanity, attempted to murder her five children by driving knitting needles into their brains through their ears.

"Jack Ketch" in New York. NEW YORK, April 28th.—Among the excursionists of some note at present in New York is William Marwood, the pupil and successor of the late Mr. Ketch, the renowned London executioner.

Indiana Greenbackers. INDIANAPOLIS, April 28th.—The State Greenbackers will meet in Convention here to-morrow to nominate a ticket.

Kansas City (Mo.) April 28th.—Cotton rains have fallen in the regions threatened with drought, and an average wheat crop is now assured.

Croquet Factory Burned. CLINTON (Mo.), April 28th.—Hudsons & Co.'s croquet factory was burned to-day. Loss, \$30,000; insurance, \$4,000.

Additional Cabinet Appointments. LONDON, April 28th.—The following additional Cabinet appointments have been made: Chamberlain, President of the Board of Trade, and John George Dodson, President of the Local Government Board.

Disabilities Under the Winter Palace Conspiracy. ST. PETERSBURG, April 28th.—The churches of the Old Believers, closed for 40 years, are to be reopened, their disabilities being removed.

The Workman Shevitch, arrested for causing the explosion in the Winter Palace on the 13th of January, has been released. He has confessed the deed, left the St. Petersburg University in 1870. He was known there as a student of the law.

Report Discredited. ST. PETERSBURG, April 28th.—No official information has yet been published respecting the capture of Shevitch. It is reported that he may be positively affirmed that the report of his capture is untrue.

The Search for the Atlanta. LONDON, April 28th.—The steamer Geneva has been ordered to cruise from latitude 42 to 50 north in search of the training ship Atlanta, which was last seen at Bermuda, January 29th, and is therefore ninety days overdue.

Germany and Bismarck. LONDON, April 28th.—The Times, in its financial article, says: The statement to the effect that leading German statesmen are high in opinion as to the value of the Treaty of Berlin, if well founded, the German Government appears at length to have realized the position of the country in that respect.

The Situation in Turkey. CONSTANTINOPLE, April 28th.—Sir Austin Layard received a telegram from Lord Salisbury asking him to specify the points of the Treaty of Berlin which are still unexecuted, and to forward a statement of the financial position of Turkey, in order that Lord Salisbury may have a correct account of those matters to his successor.

The Tobacco Question in the German Reichstag. BERLIN, April 28th.—The Reichstag to-day, by a vote of 181 to 69, adopted resolutions which are intended to remove the question of taxation on tobacco by proposing the introduction of the tobacco monopoly. No member of the Government participated in the debate, which was raised upon the abstract resolution, but Prince Hohenzollern-Langenburg, one of their usual supporters, proposed an amendment that it was impossible for the House to express an opinion on the subject.

Telegraph Cable Between Singapore and the Philippine Islands has been laid a distance of 200 miles. The laying of the cable will probably be completed in the course of a week.

Another Engagement in Afghan War. CABUL, April 28th.—Native messengers report an engagement at Firdous on the 25th inst. between General Ross and mixed tribesmen. The enemy was defeated with a loss of 1,200. The British loss is unknown.

A Great Surprise. BERLIN, April 28th.—The Socialist victory in the election at Hanburg caused a great surprise.
