DOMESTIC NEWS.

Affairs at the National Capital.

WASHINGTON, May 1st.—Representative Horace Davis today presented the memorial of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, praying that the defense of that harbor be armed with from forty to fifty modern, heavy rifled guns, and that at least two iron-turreted ironclads be maintained there; that the post of mail ships be subsidized by the United States Government, and that the United States Government be authorized to purchase the Hawaiian Islands, and to protect against the proposed discontinuance of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s letter-carrying service. Davis and Berry both presented the resolution of the California Legislature on behalf of the consular agents of the Express Company's letter service; also, the legislative resolution asking Congressional protection for settlers on public lands claimed by the Southern Pacific Railroad company in the Mussel Slough District, Tuolumne county.

Representative Daggett today presented a memorial very numerous signed by the citizens of White Pine county, Nevada, vigorously protesting against the passage of the Public Land Commission in mining bill. They argue that the enactment of the section which proposes to confine judgments to the vertical boundary planes would work irreparable injury to every branch of mining industry, drive capital from the country, and bankrupt and paralyze the energies of all industrious citizens. They further represent that the enactment of this bill requires the expenditure of thousands of dollars in locating mining claims and acquiring title, would practically put an end to explorations for minerals in new fields, and would prevent the discovery of new discoveries, and eventually turn our now prosperous State into what it was previous to the discovery of the Comstock lode.

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Emigration Extraordinary.

NEW YORK, May 1st.—Five steamships arrived today from Europe, bringing 4,331 emigrants, and 1,000 passengers in state.

MURDER AND ATTEMPTED SUICIDE.

NEW YORK, May 1st.—William Stokely, who was arrested for the murder of a woman in Brooklyn, East District, was shot dead to-night by Edward Kennedy, who is charged with the murder of a woman in Chicago, West District.

Shot Dead.

PHILADELPHIA, May 1st.—Frank Burke was shot dead last night by policeman William Shields. Burke was hurled stones at the officer, having been ordered out of the crowd.

Three Years of Repose.

A. Kelley, a defaulter of the National Bank of Mount Holly, in the amount of \$33,000, has been sentenced to the State Prison for three years.

FOREIGN NEWS.

An English Newspaper Attacks Gladstone and the Monroe Doctrine.

LONDON, May 1st.—The Pall Mall Gazette's leader, which will be regarded as an editorial, is devoted to an attack on the Monroe doctrine, and on the political immorality which seeks to quiet apprehensions regarding the relations of the United States to the continent of South America.

THE PRESIDENTIAL FIGHT.

ST. LOUIS, May 1st.—Matters pertaining to the Anti-Slavery Convention are being held here on May 6th, are taking definite shape. The committee has arranged for a reception. Headquarters have been located at the Levee Hotel. Tickets of admission have been printed, and other necessary arrangements perfected. The attendance promises to be large. The convention will meet at the Levee Hotel on May 6th, and will continue for several days.

MILWAUKEE, May 1st.—The primaries today are strongly against a third term in the city. The city selected 22 delegates to the State Convention, 10 for the Republican party, 1 for Edmunds and 1 for Washburn. The feeling in the city is very strong for Sherman and against the third term delegates. Jefferson county gives Washburn 2, Sherman 1, Grant 2, not known 1. A resolution was passed in relation to the delegates.

WISCONSIN (W. Va.) May 1st.—The Republicans have elected 35 delegates and instructed them for Blaine, to the State Convention. West Virginia will be solid for Blaine. Anti-third-term resolutions were adopted.

OHIO (Neb.) May 1st.—The Republican County Convention met last afternoon and elected a full delegation of seventeen for seven hours with Grant.

THE REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION WILL BE HELD AT COLUMBUS, MAY 19th, and Blaine will receive Nebraska's 16 delegates.

NEW YORK, May 1st.—The Independent Republican organization have adopted a supplementary address to the Independent Republican Convention at St. Louis, reaffirming their opposition to the nomination of General Grant. They do not believe the Chicago Republican Convention will meet any address or resolutions protesting against the nomination of General Grant unless that Convention becomes convinced that General Grant, if nominated, will be solid for Blaine. Anti-third-term resolutions were adopted.

CHALLENGE OF A SHOOTER.

LONDON, May 1st.—John William Oakes, 19 years of age, the champion 1000-yards shot of England, challenges any man in the world to shoot forty shots, distance 500 yards, at a target four feet in diameter, with eight-inch bull's-eyes, or he will give eight points out of eighty shots, for £250 a side and a 100-guinea challenge cup. He will give or take £20 for the right to shoot.

A Bond Distribution.

LONDON, May 1st.—The trustees of the Bolivian bondholders have sold at 109 3/4 a sufficient amount of the bonds to meet the obligations to distribute the £45 per cent, ordered by the Court, but the distribution is hindered by various legal proceedings, which the trustees are endeavoring to settle.
