NEW YORK, May 14th.—The Sun to-day says: We are informed on behalf of Justice Field, that his letter received on occasion of the Boss Shepherd banquet was only formal, and not really respectful. In fact, we are told that it was simply a brief declaration, without expression of feeling toward Shepherd, but it is admitted that Beverly Tucker, who has hitherto been the most active and efficient promoter of Field's campaign, was present at the banquet, and made a very eloquent speech in honor of the great public reformer and Boss of Washington.

Receipts of the Government—Sale of Land by Indiana.

WASHINGTON, May 14th.—At the Cabinet meeting to-day Secretary Sherman laid before the Cabinet a statement showing that the daily receipts of the Government for the present month had averaged more than \$1,000,000.

The Crow Indians have agreed to sell the Government 2,000,000 acres of their reservation in Montana for \$80,000 per year for twenty-five years, and the Shoshone and Banrock Indians, of the Fort Hall (Idaho) reservation, have signed an agreement disposing of 400,000 acres of their reservation for \$10,000 per year for twenty years. The Indians will remain upon certain portions of their reservations.

A Song and Dance Man Dying.

NEW YORK, May 14th.—William H. Delahanty, the well-known song and dance man, is dying of kidney consumption at his home in this city. A theatrical friend is already arranging for his funeral, as he has a family which is likely to be destitute. It is not thought likely he will live long enough to know the result of the benefit performance.

APPEAL FOR AID.

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LECTURE OF REV. I. S. KALLOCH.

Rev. I. S. Kalloch lectured last evening at the Ninth-street Baptist Church, in this city, to a full house, upon the subject of "Christianity and the Chinese." In the course of his lecture he said:

Have we any reason to believe that the incensed stoicism of the Chinese character can be affected by the gospel? And can this be best done by carrying the gospel to China or bringing the Chinese to us? The questions are important for one of the strongest supporters of the Chinese invasion is the opinion of a great many good men that the providence of God is sending them here for their conversion, and hence that those of us who fight against their coming are fighting against God. Christianity is adapted to all classes and all countries, Caucasian or African, Asiatic or Indian. Confucianism may have some special adaptation to the Chinese mind, but Christianity is the religion for Man. Christianity has penetrated China, and won some of its most significant victories there. The present month of the year of the Tatar invasion was a religious rebellion. It had allies that had no sympathy with its origin; it was started by a man of great ability, but it was a religious rebellion, and a practical acceptance of Christianity. They fought like the soldiers of Cromwell, and they fought like the soldiers of Cromwell. Missionary efforts for the conversion of the Chinese have not been successful. There are now a thousand converts. More than a hundred faithful missionaries are laboring there. And "the noblest Roman of them all" is our own beloved Dr. Dean. There is no necessary antagonism between Confucianism and Christianity. The greater includes the less. Christianity is the only complete religion. It completes the Confucianism for the past by adding hope for the future; stability by progress; faith in man by hope in God; interest in the world with interest in the soul of another and better. Christianity does not exclude but it includes the good of Confucianism.

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
