POLICE COURT.—The Chinese Theater cases, yesterday in the Police Court, were brought up and considered on demurrer. The demurrer was sustained, and the cases were set for trial tomorrow.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

The Board of Supervisors resumed its session yesterday at 10 A. M., and business was transacted as follows:—

Warrant—No. 100—allowed and drawn on Swamp Land District No. 3. P. C. Counts, \$125; Matthew Madge, \$100; J. W. Brocas, \$285.78. Claims were also allowed of Burchard for \$20; Annie Murphy, \$15; and Wm. Webster, of Wm. McDermott and others for a portion of Mississippi township and the same as San Joaquin District, was set for hearing to-morrow at 2 o'clock P. M.

On Tuesday evening a resolution by Mr. Tracy was adopted declaring that charges against Principals or teachers must be specific, in writing, and signed by the complainant, and not by his attorney. Other parts of the resolution, regarding rules, were referred to the committee on education.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Board of Education met again last evening. Present, a full Board, 49 ladies and 36 men as spectators.

Mr. Hornbrower, from the Committee on Rules for Investigations, reported that he had drawn up a set of rules, but had not had time to confer with his associates fully. REARMENT.—Secretary of State Blaine is having the public relations of his office in the State Capitol rearranged. The entrance door heretofore in use is to be closed and the public entrance will be by the door next north.

CHINESE THEATER CASES.—In the Police Court yesterday the Chinese theater cases for maintaining a nuisance by disturbing the quiet of the neighborhood, came up for argument upon a question of law raised by a demurrer of defendants, to the effect that the company having obtained the necessary licenses for State county and city, such licenses amounting to a contract giving them the privilege and protection of the authorities of the city for carrying on the theater in their own manner, and that the Chinese theater is conducted as known to the public for the people, and was not a nuisance.

THE NEW ROLLING MILLS.—Concerning the rolling-mills projected some seven or eight months since for erection by the Central Pacific Railroad Company on its grounds in this city, it may be said that it is now carried out, and most of the patterns for the heavy castings are now finished. It is probably the most extensive rolling-mill ever to be located in a few days. The new works will be begun between the railroad tracks at the northeast end of the foundry and the shops.

TAKEN THROUGH.—John Thomas, alias C. F. Housner, who was wanted upon the charge of grand larceny for stealing a pair of mules in Butte county, has been arrested at Sonoma, and passed through the city en route to his former residence in charge of Sheriff Sprague of Oroville. When arrested he had disposed of the mules and had in his possession a large mare and colt, and a sorrel horse, which were left at Sonoma.

DEATH OF A PROMINENT CALIFORNIAN.—Yesterday Grand Secretary Keller of the Order of Caucasians received notice of the death of Robert Leiper, Vice-Grand Chief of the Order in this State. He died on the 17th instant at Moser Valley, Esmeralda county, Nevada. The funeral took place at Reno under the auspices of Camp No. 37 of that place.

NEW SUPERVISORS.—Governor Perkins yesterday appointed David Stewart as Supervisor of the First District for the county of Sonoma, vice Trivison. Also, W. H. Lawrence as Supervisor for the First District of San Mateo county.

THE KETTLER CLUB. A party of some twelve couples of young people was made up on Monday evening and inaugurated a surprise party at the residence of Albert Gallatin, on the opposite side of the street.

THE CHAIN-GANG. The yard engine Governor Stanford, the pioneer passenger locomotive of the Central Pacific Railroad, has recently been overhauled and repaired. It looks as bright as a new trade dollar now.

WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH THE WATER? The complaint has been quite generally made for the past few days that the hydrant water of the city has a very unwholesome, musty taste, as if coming from a rotten wooden cistern or tank, which taste is not found in water taken from the river direct. With a view to ascertain the cause a representative of the RECORD-UNION yesterday made the ascent to the top of the old Water Works building and inspected the reservoir supply.
