KNIGHTS TEMPLAR.

The Great Parade at Chicago - Immense Number of Spectators.

BEAUTY OF THE DECORATIONS.

Grandest Affair Ever Witnessed in the Country.

CHICAGO, August 17th. - The great day of the Knights Templar opened cloudy. Early in the morning a smart rain fell and laid the dust nicely. The sun then appeared, and at the hour advertised for starting everything was favorable for the procession. The different commanders were, however, tardy in getting at their appointed places, and it was nearly 11 o'clock before the different columns moved. By that time the sky had clouded and some drops of rain fell. It had no effect, however, on the crowds, who thronged the streets and occupied every available inch on the sidewalks. The windows were filled shortly after 8 o'clock, and many people occupied precarious positions on the cross-arms of telegraph poles. The committee had wisely made the line of march extend over nearly eight miles of ground, and gave a fine opportunity for all to see. Along Washburn avenue thousands of temporary seats had been erected, and were readily rented at good prices.

THE PROCESSION IN MOTION.

It was afternoon when the last division wheeled into line, and by that time the advance guard of police who headed the procession had reached Lake street on the return march. It was estimated that nearly 30,000 Knights were in line, and it required about three hours for the entire procession to pass a given point. Every part of the parade went off with the precision that is only attended by the best drilled corps, and the evolutions were performed with beautiful exactness that drew forth some of the loudest applause. The brilliant uniforms, the inspiring music and the bright sun, which eventually appeared, rendered the scene remarkable in every respect, and one which will not be likely to be witnessed again in many years, as it has never been before.

THE DECORATIONS.

Were on a profuse and almost extravagant scale, rarely ever having displaying banners with Masonic devices, while evergreen wreaths and richly contrasting colors relieved the somber hues of the buildings and the quantity of black required to appropriately represent the historical subjects. Connected with the display of the Conclave the newspaper offices were beautifully decorated, especially those which were in the direct line of the march. The wholesale houses and the important retail buildings were also covered with banners, flags, festoons and motes. Along State street the stores were radiant with devices, several thousand dollars having been expended on some single buildings. The sixteen arches on Washburn avenue, between Van Buren and Twenty-second street, were completed during the night and excited great admiration for their beauty of design.

THE LINE OF MARCH.

Was kept open by a strong guard of policemen who flanked the streets, and who were assisted by continuous lines of vehicles which were ranged on either side of the street and occupied by thousands of spectators. The street cars brought apparently endless crowds into the streets, and the incoming trains continued to bring the people from the outlying towns and cities. The Knights gathered on four streets facing east. The division on Lake street, the one farthest north, moved first, eastward to Washburn avenue, and upon reaching that thoroughfare turned south, and continued its march to Twenty-first street. As the last of this division reached Washington street, the column in that street tied in and followed to Twenty-first. The same was done with the columns which were on Main and Jackson streets.
