CALIFORNIA.

The President at Monterey.

MONTEREY, September 16th.—The Presidential party arrived in Monterey at about 10 o'clock, and were escorted to the Hotel del Monte, where preparations had been made for their accommodation.

The President, Mrs. Hayes, General Sherman and others of the party were in attendance at the reception, when the usual speeches were made, hand shaking, including it, and the party returned to the Hotel del Monte, where they then departed for San Francisco.

(SECOND DISPATCH.)

MONTEREY, September 16th.—The Presidential party concluded to remain here until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock, at which hour they leave here and proceed direct to Menlo Park as the guests of Senator Sharon.

The entire party were driven out to Pacific Grove, Point Pinos, Carmel Mission and other places of interest. They all express themselves highly pleased with their visit.

The Placerville Fair—Eases Accident. PLACERVILLE, September 16th.—There was a marked improvement in the attendance to-day, both at the Pavilion and grounds, and there is every indication that to-morrow will be the best of the fair.

The race between Skikyou Girl, Young Diamond, Del and A. F. Fitch was withdrawn on account of lameness. The race between the other three was warmly contested, Oakland raising two heats and the Girl one, with one dead heat, when it became too dark to proceed.

The race will be finished with a running match, half-mile heats, three in five, for a purse of \$200. Clabbers Wild was thrown from a wagon during a runaway this morning and seriously injured by a sharp piece of rock penetrating his forehead.

Fire at Marysville—Woman Burned to Death. MARYSVILLE, September 16th.—A small unoccupied frame dwelling, belonging to Mary Ann Keenan, on California alley, between Seventh and Eighth streets, was completely destroyed by fire at 11 o'clock last night.

The outbuildings on the premises were also destroyed, and adjacent buildings slightly damaged. This morning the charred remains of Mrs. Keenan were found in the ruins of the outbuildings.

She was seen in a trotting race, mile heats, beat three in five, for a purse of \$200, between Skikyou Girl, Young Diamond, Del and A. F. Fitch.

(SECOND DISPATCH.) MARYSVILLE, September 16th.—The unfortunate death of Mrs. Keenan by last night's fire is the general topic of conversation to-day. At the coroner's inquest, held this afternoon, nothing was elicited to satisfactorily solve the mystery surrounding the affair.

Boy Seriously Injured. PETALUMA, September 16th.—Steven Caranach, son of John Caranach of this city, fell from a gum tree about 5 o'clock this evening, and sustained serious if not fatal injuries. His skull is badly fractured, and it is feared that he is otherwise injured internally.

Republican Mass Meeting. UPPER LAKES, September 16th.—The Republican campaign was opened in this county this evening by a mass meeting at Lakeport, at which Hon. E. K. Van Ness addressed a large audience of citizens from all parts of the county. Governor Perkins was expected, but did not come.

Steamer Wrecked. EMBURY CITY, September 16th.—The steamer Quikstep went ashore yesterday, during a thick fog, at the mouth of Coquille river, and is supposed to be a total loss. No lives were lost.

California M. E. Conference. PETALUMA, September 16th.—Dr. Jewell preached the annual missionary sermon last night to a large and attentive congregation. This forenoon was full of interest.

The Conference met at 9 o'clock, Bishop Wiley in the chair. The report of the Executive Committee was read. The reports of the Presiding Elders not read yesterday were completed to-day, showing a considerable advancement.

Political Wedding in Santa Cruz. SANTA CRUZ, September 16th.—The Workingmen and Democrats of this county have coalesced, the former nominating J. F. Cunningham for the Assembly, J. M. Lessor for District Attorney, T. W. Wright for Surveyor, and Dr. E. P. Vaux for Coroner, and the latter Elmer Dakin for Sheriff, Andrew Alexander for Clerk, George B. Card for Treasurer, and Frank K. Aston for Assessor.

Democratic Meeting—Mexican Celebration—Serious Party Split. MERCED, September 16th.—The Democrats opened the campaign here last night by a meeting addressed by Wallace Leach, candidate for Congress in the Fourth District, and Del Valle of Los Angeles. Nearly one-half of those present were Republicans, all of whom gave respectful attention to what was said.

The Mexican portion of our population to-day are celebrating the independence of Mexico by the firing of a cannon, a display of flags from all Mexican and other Spanish houses and a grand ball this evening.

The case of the United States vs. Laf Grand, mate of the bark David Healdy, for manslaughter in July last, was laid over until to-morrow.

The Grand Jury have indicted Analson, the Russian who killed Lawrence recently, but it is likely that the case may go over to the next term.

Stranded Ship Floated. PORT TOWNSEND, September 16th.—Captain Stodder, of the revenue cutter Wolcott, reports having seen the ship Belvidere in the position mentioned yesterday, and while going to their assistance was informed by the Captain of a pilot boat that the ship was working off, and soon afterward he saw that she was out of danger, and so returned here.

Items from Port Townsend. PORT TOWNSEND, September 16th.—The District Court convened here Monday, Judge Green presiding.

To-day W. G. Garfield was indicted for the larceny of \$76 while acting as agent for some Indians.
