The opinion of the District Attorney was received in relation to the case of the City of Sacramento vs. the Board of Supervisors to the authority of the Board of Supervisors to act in relation thereto. He gave as his opinion that under the Political Code the Board of Supervisors on Board of Health is either empowered to provide leprosy quarters or lazarettos for such cases when found to exist within their jurisdiction, as it is also their duty to enforce the Code further providing for such cases, all expenses incurred in caring for persons afflicted with infectious diseases must be provided for by the Board of Supervisors of the city of Sacramento, who may make appropriations therefor out of the special street fund, if the same is sufficient; if not, they may by taxation provide a fund therefor. On motion, the opinion was referred to the Board of City Trustees, appearing to the Board of Supervisors that the city government is the proper authority to take action in the premises. On motion of Mr. Christy, the Board of Supervisors of District No. 27 was instructed to open the road between the lands of Mr. Kelly and Mr. Pierce. Board adjourned until 10 A. M. to-day.

PRESIDENT HAYES

FORMALLY RECEIVED BY THE GOVERNOR AND STATE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

He Shakes Hands with Sacramento, and Speaks to an Immense Audience—At the Pavilion.

Yesterday was a gala day in Sacramento. Early in the day the streets were a scene of activity. Men in uniform, guns in hand, were flocking toward the Pavilion almost before the sun was up. Before 9 o'clock people began to congregate in the vicinity of Governor Stanford's residence, and before the arrival of the military escort the streets were rendered almost impassable. At an early hour the detail from Sumner Post, G. A. R., were on hand and kept the passage way to the front gate clear. At 10 o'clock the staff of the Brigadier-General of the Fourth Brigade took position at the corner of Eighth and L, followed by the First Artillery Regiment, the Fourth Brigade, Colonel Creed Haymond commanding, and the Mexican War Veterans. The military formed an escort, preceded by the band. The President and party were then escorted from the front entrance, and proceeded to the carriage in waiting, and the line of march was taken up along N to Seventh, to M, to Tenth.
