The Absence of President Hayes Criticized.

PLAIN TALK FROM A SOUTHERNER

A Detective Unearths the Author of the Alleged Garfield Letter.

PATRIOTIC SPEECH BY GENERAL GRANT.

Hancock Will Pay no Further Attention to General Grant's Remarks.

NEW YORK, October 25th.—The Times' Columbus (O.), special says: There has been no little unfavorable criticism directed at President Hayes for not being in Ohio to vote at the recent election, when his presence might have been a source of encouragement to the Republicans, and that, too, without uttering a word. One of the most prominent managers of the Republican party in the recent struggle made the remark that if the President did not come home to vote he would never forgive him for neglecting the interests of the party which placed him at the head of the nation. This gentleman was one of the faithful band who secured his nomination at Cincinnati by personal and persistent efforts in his behalf, while the administration of Hayes has not been of such a character as to increase his popularity. The delegation which visited Garfield almost daily saw a marked contrast when compared with those who visited Governor Hayes previous to his election. Garfield, at Mentor, an inaccessible little village when compared with Columbus, the geographical center of the State, with its twelve railroads, has been visited by five delegations where Hayes was greeted by one. The marked increase of the Congressional district in Garfield's old Congressional district is evidence of his popularity. It is said of him that during his Congressional career he has never failed to be at home to vote, and seldom if ever failed to be on hand at the local or village elections. In Ohio, as elsewhere, he is growing stronger every day.

THE FORGER OF THE MOREY LETTER UN- EARTHED.

CHICAGO, October 25th.—Stanley Huntley telegraphs the Tribune from New York that he has discovered the author of the alleged Garfield letter. It is one Kennard Phelps, one of the editors of the Truth, who was un- earthed by detective Loman in the employ of the National Committee. Phelps is an expert in the imitation of all kinds of chiro- graphy, and has copied from many of the names of all the men who signed the Decla- ration of Independence in so skillful a man- ner that a cursory look would indicate that he was genuine. He has a mania for imitating handwriting. He is an active and able poli- tician, and has been a member of the Na- tional Committee. ANOTHER CLINCHER.

NEW YORK, October 25th.—Mr. Jewell to-day received the following letter from General Garfield:

To Hon. Marshall Jewell, Chairman of the Republican National Convention, 211 Fifth Avenue, New York.—Dear Sir: In my dispatches of yesterday and this evening, which are also sent by mail, I have denounced the Morey letter as a base forgery—stupid, brutal sentiments which I never expressed nor entertained. The lithographic copy shows a very clumsy attempt to imitate my penmanship and signature. Anyone who has seen my handwriting will instantly see that the letter is spurious. Very truly yours, A. REWARD OFFERED.

NEW YORK, October 25th.—The Tribune has this: "We are authorized by Hon. S. B. Chittenden of Brooklyn to offer a reward of \$5,000 for evidence that shall lead to the arrest and conviction of the forger who concocted the so-called 'Chinese letter' and wrote General Garfield's name. Chittenden's prompt action fully expresses the general estimate of the monstrous crime in which William H. Barnum has made himself the shameless participant. It is believed that clues to the forger's hideout have been discovered, and that the culprit may be found within eight days of the City Hall. 'Hunt the rascal down.'"

CHANCE FOR COMPROMISE.

NEW YORK, October 25th.—The Democratic Committee sent to California on Friday last telegraphic plates of the forged Garfield-Morey letter, with a view to having that State with copies. The Republican Committee sent no more than a fac-simile copy of Garfield's autograph in reply, proposing the forgery. No one can compare the respective handwriting without being convinced that they are the work of different hands.

THE FORGED LETTER BUSINESS BROKEN OUT IN A NEW SPOT.

DES MOINES (Ia.), October 25th.—The fraudulent and forged letter business has broken out in a new spot, and on a new person—this time the Presidential candidate, Weaver. His last political friend, a soldier from Iowa, comes forward and declares that the letter from Weaver to Gillette, published in the New York Star, was neither written nor signed by him; that his allegations are absolute lies, and the letter itself a forgery. The letter declares that Weaver is against fusion every- where, because it would be injurious to the Republican party, in whose interest he is laboring. Weaver makes his denial before a Notary, and in the strongest terms.

THE REGISTRATION DIFFICULTY AT NEW ORLEANS.

NEW ORLEANS, October 25th.—This afternoon the registration question was discussed by the State and United States officers upon the registration question is assuming grave proportions, and a conflict may be expected at any moment. Agents have already been made of parties registering within ten days prior to the election, as specified in the law for the registration of voters. At present the Charles Cavares, Supervisor of Registration, informed Colonel Williams, Chief Registrar, that he would resist further arrests with all the power of the State. Deputy United States Marshals have received instructions to caution any person attempting to register that they do so under pain of arrest. When this warning is unheeded, an arrest will be made. Registration is going on briskly at the registration office, even the negroes taking advantage of the few days remaining.

CHICAGO, October 25th.—The Inter-Ocean's Washington special says: Registration troubles in New Orleans called out the following telegram to-day:

Hon. J. A. Hubbell, Chairman of Congressional Committee, Washington: Officers of registration and parties legally registered were arrested to-day. Republican Supervisors report that registration officers register white men, many of whom are unknown and refuse to register colored men. The State Supervisor of Registration refused to allow the United States Supervisors to take possession of the office of registration, to enable them to ascertain the manner of registration—a clear violation of the law. The Democrats evidently intend to adopt desperate means to prevent the election of Republican Congressmen.
