AVASTUS (Ga.), November 4th.—The Chronicle and Constitutionalist says, in reference to the election: "The South is not the satisfaction of knowing that the left part of the bargain, and if the hero of Gettysburg is not President it is not her fault. We think, too, that she has for the last time been led, lamb-like, to the slaughter. Her experiments with local civilians and military heroes have not been profitable in the past, and the future holds out no hope."

LOUISIANA, November 4th.—The Daily News says: "The chances seem to be that during the next four years, contrary to expectation, the South will become more reconciled to the Union, and the North will not be divided against itself. The result is one of more importance than foreign observers fully recognize. In its personal and superficially political aspects, the contest might seem to be an English public to have a very profound interest. Neither party, it seems to us, has proved itself equal to the opportunities since the closing of the civil war. The Democratic faction retained a power the Republicans maintained their historical career. Certain of the political principles of the two parties were now the same, yet their antecedents are different. The best which the Republican party at that time represented, and always represented, the principles which seemed to be down in the dust when the Democrats of New York were stirring up resistance to the levy of Union troops, and which triumphed in spite of the Democrats at Gettysburg, Savannah and Richmond."

THE Post, in its leader, remarks: "With the result, as far as the European powers are interested in American politics, we on this side of the Atlantic have reason to be satisfied. The Advertiser says: "We cannot but regret the result. In the first place, there is no comparison between the party which in two years ago gave us a third term Republican party government, and the party which in the school of Lincoln, Coolidge and Cameron, but quite as little to that of reformers like Adams or administrators like Sherman. He is the nominee of the anti-slavery interests. Hancock is, with few exceptions, the most distinguished man in the country, and his high moral and political character is a guarantee of his high moral and political character. He is a man of distinction, and even if his election were to be a mere concession, it would not prevent his retention in active office, when twenty-nine-thirtieths of the soldiers, officers and generals of the Federal army were relegated to the same position as the two years ago, when a man of character equally high, so man so completely answering to what Englishmen call gentleman, has filled the Presidential chair. Garfield belongs to the type of which Lincoln was the best and America is fortunate to have had a man of this type in the White House. The Times believe that England has good reason to hope for the way of a dignified and worthy policy from the Republicans and Democrats, and expects an eminently good administration of the country, when all returns are in, will have a handsome majority over both Resisters and Republicans."

WASHINGTON TERRITORY. OLYMPIA, November 4th.—Thurston county, official gives Grant 122, Bloomfield 153 votes. Estimates based on partial returns give Burke 30 majority in Mason county. MISCELLANEOUS. Journalistic Comments. NEW YORK, November 4th.—The Journal of Commerce (Democratic) says: "The Republicans have a very strong majority in the country may be congratulated that Garfield is fairly elected. The result must be accepted that the North is not willing to institute a change of administration. We have several times protested against personal denunciations of the Republican nominees, because there was nothing to justify such vituperation. We hope the dominant party may have a working majority in both Houses, that they may be held accountable for the management of the affairs of the country. We shall give a cordial support to all that is just and honorable in the coming administration."

MASSACHUSETTS. Boston, November 4th.—With four losses to declare from Garfield's plurality over Hancock in the State is 52,292.

MICHIGAN. DETROIT, November 4th.—Garfield has about 60,000 majority in this State. The Greenbackers polled a strong vote in a few localities, but elsewhere were weak. The Legislature is strongly Republican. The Congressional delegation remains solid. The several districts carried against the combined opposition are creditable triumphs.

MISSOURI. ST. LOUIS, November 4th.—This State will probably give 40,000 Democratic majority. It is reported that the Democrats concede the election to Congress of Van Horn in the Eighth District. St. Louis, November 4th.—A reliable report from Sedalia, Mo., says that Colonel Phillips (Dem.) is beaten by Judge Rice (Greenback Republican) by 400 to 600 majority.

NEVADA. CARSON, November 4th.—The loss of Nevada is the only one secured by the Republicans to the work of Sharon.

NEW HAMPSHIRE. CONCORD, November 4th.—Garfield's plurality is about 4,000. Hall (Rep.) is elected in the First District by over 600 plurality. Eliza (Rep.) is elected in the Second District by over 1,000.

NEW JERSEY. NEW YORK, November 4th.—Ludlow's majority over Potts, for Governor of New Jersey, appears to be about 600. The majority for the Democratic Electoral ticket will be 2,000.

NEW YORK. ALBANY, November 4th.—The Argus places the Republican majority in the State on the Presidential ticket at 14,304.

NEW YORK, November 4th.—The Times to-morrow will publish a revised list of the majorities in this State. Garfield's majority is fixed at 29,000, with the assurance that the official returns, which cannot be canvassed under a week, will not vary materially from these figures.

NEW YORK, November 4th.—A. M.—The Herald says: Garfield's majority in this State is about 30,000. Garfield's majority in this State is about 20,000.

NEW YORK, November 4th.—A. M.—The Tribune's figures on the State election foot up 22,000 majority for Garfield.

NEW YORK, November 4th.—A. M.—The World says: The additional returns of Tuesday's election in this State increased Garfield's majority by the figures given yesterday in the counties of Alleghany, Oneida, Orange, Steuben and Herkimer, and decreases this majority in Columbia, Jefferson and St. Lawrence, while Hancock's majority in Albany county is increased 153 over the previous report. The letter county is again exceptionally well, and gives Hancock a majority of 5,595, against 1,180 for Tillam in 1876. The changes make Mr. Garfield's apparent majority in the State 14,467. It will not vary much from 15,000.

OHIO. COLUMBUS, November 4th.—Returns from sixty-one counties show that Garfield's plurality in the State will be about 25,000.

NORTH CAROLINA. RALEIGH, November 4th.—The indications are that the State has gone Democratic by a reduced majority. The Second District elects a Republican Congressman. The Third, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and Eighth Districts elect Democrats. The returns are not sufficient from the First and Fourth Districts to indicate the result. The Legislature is believed to be Democratic.

OREGON. PORTLAND, November 4th.—The following is the latest election news: The clear Republican majority this side of the Cascade mountains is estimated at 1,300. This estimate includes the southern

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
