BOARD OF HEALTH MEETING.

A special session of the Board of Health was held last evening. There were present Mayor Turner, in the chair, Drs. Hughson, Pyburn, Henry, Kellogg and Dart; also Health Officer Phillips.

The report of the City Dispensary physician for the month of October was received and read. The Board of Health has decided to issue a bill for drugs and medicines furnished to the dispensary for the month of October, amounting to \$100, and to be paid out of the fund for the month of October, and the sum of \$100 allowed.

The subject of the imminence of small-pox in this city, the Board of Health, in view of the fact that the following notice to the physicians of the city, and the public generally, is issued by the Board:

To the Physicians and Public of Sacramento: In view of the imminence of an epidemic of small-pox in our midst, the Board of Health of this city, in its duty respectfully but earnestly to call the attention of the public to the duty of destroying all reports of any and all cases of small-pox to the Board, for its removal to the special hospital provided for such cases, or, where this is not required, in order that the cases be put under proper quarantine regulations and restrictions; also that citizens generally be requested, as a matter of public duty, to report to the Board all cases of disease coming to their knowledge to the same end.

The Board deems it their duty likewise to improve upon the existing laws, and to make such changes as may be necessary, and in many cases recommended. Those who are unable to pay a physician for such services are informed that it is the duty of the City Dispensary physician to perform said service free at the City and County Dispensary, on the Court-house lot, Seventh and I streets, where he is required to call, for the purpose of receiving such cases, on or before the 10th of the month.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Board of Education, respectfully recommending said Board that they make it imperative upon all pupils in attendance at public schools to be vaccinated in all cases where any great length of time has elapsed since the operation has been performed.

No further business appearing, the Board adjourned until the next regular meeting, in December.

THE SMALL POX SCARE.—Various rumors were current again yesterday of cases of small-pox which were said to have been found in the city, but of all mentioned, up to late hour last evening it may be said, upon the testimony of the Board of Health and other physicians of the city, that no case has occurred since the one which was brought from Blue Canyon to the post house, near the County Hospital. As a matter of precaution, the Board of Health and Board of Education, and an order was issued by the Board of Health to the physicians and people generally of the city. This is not done because there is occasion for alarm, but only to urge and bring into operation such measures as are best calculated, while the disease is present on the coast, to avert its introduction by epidemic in the city. There are at present no cases here. The action advised by the Board of Health is that they be in the line of precaution, and which is proper if the disease does not appear here, and wise in case it should.

THE FIRE LAST EVENING.—Last evening about 7 o'clock an alarm of fire was sounded from box 24, corner of Twelfth and G streets, caused by the burning of an unoccupied dwelling-house belonging to Mr. Main, and located on G, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, opposite the brick school building. The building was recently moved from Twelfth and C streets, and its rebuilding had just been completed. The roof was in place when the fire was discovered, and the fire department was upon the ground and extinguished the flames in an almost incredible short space of time after the alarm was given. The damage to the building was confined to the roof and upper story, except that, at which the children of the Protestant Orphan Asylum have been invited. The usual entertainment will also take place in the evening.


