

GLADSTONE ON THE PROSPECT.

Mr. Gladstone's presentation of the views and purposes of his government at the Lord Mayor's dinner has been looked for with more than usual interest, because of the complexity of the problems with which the English Ministry is at present confronted.

It was no doubt expected that the Premier would on this occasion state the intentions of the Government in regard to the Irish state propositions, fully, but he appears to have handled the subject very cautiously, and merely to have intimated that while the Government is determined to rectify whatever palpable wrongs may be demonstrated in the Irish land system, it must as a preliminary restore order and law to that country.

In doing this, Mr. Gladstone asserted, it would employ whatever measures might be deemed necessary for the enforcement of law and the restoration of order. He said: "The obligation is incumbent upon us to protect every citizen in the enjoyment of his life and property, and it may be that, under certain circumstances we may be compelled to do so."

It is a matter of course such a culmination to the land movement would result in its forcible suppression, and would not be a disaster upon those who have engineered it. It often happens in such cases that the leaders find themselves unable to control the masses, and that the arguments which were intended only to stimulate them to legitimate political action are interpreted as justification for lawless and therefore fatal proceedings.

Mr. Gladstone's Government has undertaken the experiment of dealing with Parnell and his colleagues by prosecutions. It remains to be seen whether this policy will succeed. There are precedents for it, undoubtedly, the O'Connell and Smith O'Brien agitations having been practically quelled and brought to confusion by similar agencies.
