A train on the New York Central jumped the track near Lockport yesterday, and three persons were injured.

Nearly \$2,000,000 in gold was withdrawn from the Bank of England for New York yesterday.

The house of the Sisters of Mercy in Tuam, County Galway, Ireland, has been burned.

The All, who governed Canada under the British throughout the war, has obtained the Viceroy's permission to retire to India with his family.

At Paris, Madame Montfort, a well-known writer, has been sentenced by default to six months imprisonment and 500 francs fine for offenses against public morals.

Grant is expected in Washington at the opening of Congress. He will remain there a few days. He will then visit the city in the house which he has purchased in New York.

His son Frederick will, it is rumored, soon leave the army and engage in the railroad business.

The Land Leaguers at Brooklyn, N. Y., on Tuesday evening appointed a committee to confer with New York members in reference to the advisability of sending General B. F. Butler to Ireland to defend Farnell and other indicted members of the League.

Hogs to the number of 1,111,000 were received at Chicago during November, the largest receipts ever known for a single month, with a value of \$12,250,000. The clearings of the Chicago Clearing-house for November were \$18,000,000, the largest ever recorded.

The National Council of the Union League of America holds its annual session at Philadelphia on December 9th.

Clara A. McCarty was elected Superintendent of Schools of Pierce county, W. T., by a majority of 408, polling the largest number of votes of any candidate on the ticket.
