LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

AN L-STREET MURDER—Yesterday afternoon about 1 o'clock, a row occurred in an L-street mansion presided over by a female who reveals under the classic name of "Two-Two Johnny." Officer Lee, hearing a woman screaming, and seeing a crowd rushing toward the house, put in a hasty appearance and found "Two-Two Johnny" standing in the front room covered with blood and profusely bleeding from a large wound on the right temple. A large colored man named Ed Gaines, who lives with her, was arrested with his right arm around her neck and his left hand under her chin, probably in the act of supporting her.

WHEAT ALONG THE RIVER.—Captain Foster has made a careful estimate of the amount of wheat which is in the warehouses along the upper Sacramento on the first of the present month, and places it at about 71,000 tons. This is a lower estimate than has been made by others, and is probably not above the actual amount now held in that section for a rise in the present prices. At the figure now offered, say \$9 per cental, this quantity still on hand is worth \$2,600,000. The amount of wheat now in warehouses in the river section of the valley above Marysville, is about 80 per cental, this last year, as did also the total crop. In 1879 there was transported by boats from the upper Sacramento about 115,000 tons of wheat and this year it will be less than 125,000 tons by the close of the present month. The wheat which has been shipped from along the Feather river and that now stored in the warehouses is not included in the above statement, and would add between 30,000 and 40,000 tons.

STOLEN CLOTHES RECOVERED.—A few days since notice was left at the police office that a coat which had been made by a tailor in the city for a person residing at Rocklin had been stolen at the latter place, and a sample of the goods was furnished with which to identify it. Officer Lee soon ascertained that the coat had been sold at a second-hand clothing store on K street, and would to another party. Yesterday the proprietor of the store recovered the coat and delivered it to Mr. Lee. A few evenings since a suit of clothes was stolen from a room in the Brooklyn Hotel, and being reported to the police office, were recovered from a person who had taken it to K street by Chief Karcher and Officer Lee. The facility with which stolen goods are disposed of at some of the second-hand establishments renders them a prolific source for police inspection and raising money upon the fruits of crime.

NOT THAT KIND.—A scandalous story for a few days had prominence in public gossip. It involves alike the innocent and the guilty, and is of that character which the prurient mind and the morbid appetite of the unclean feed upon. Some, whose comprehension of decent journalism is measured by such tastes, in their disappointment at not finding this precious morsel in print, have meanly descended to the expedient that they, or other than conscientious motives actuated the withholding of the inmodest to it. Such people have forgotten, perhaps, that the press of Sacramento is not public scavenger, and do not willingly set such dishes as those referred to before the families of this community. It is bad enough to be compelled at any time to even refer to them, and scandalous in making record of judicial and police proceedings.

POLICE COURT.—In the Police Court yesterday the matter of Samuel Sauborn, heretofore found guilty of cruelty to animals, the awarding of judgment was postponed at defendant's request, until the 14th inst.; Manuel Silver, accused of having committed battery, was discharged for want of prosecution; the case of J. W. Findley, charged with indecent exposure of person, was partially tried and continued until this morning; the charge of vagrancy against him was continued until the same time; Ah Hoe, arrested for an assault with a deadly weapon, was granted a continuance until the 14th inst. The Court then adjourned.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

The Board of Supervisors met for its final session for the term yesterday morning at 10 o'clock. Present, Messrs. Blair, Beckley, Christy, Dremann and Wilson. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The Board was called to order as a Swamp Land Board, and upon motion, warrants drawn on Reclamation District No. 341, and signed by the President and Secretary of the district, were approved as follows: M. P. McCarty, for \$385 42; O. P. Braun, for \$176 00; Ah Quong, \$106 81; Y. Lo, \$25; J. M. Upham, \$33 71; M. J. Weimer, \$312 50; Jim Yung, \$218 75; Jim Yung, \$282 12.

Business was then resumed as a Board of Supervisors, and upon motion of Mr. Wilson, the Clerk was instructed to notify all the Road Overseers in the county to make final settlement as such officers on or before January 1, 1881.

Reports for November were received from the county officers, which show that fees were paid in as follows: To Sheriff A. Hill, \$90; to H. B. Beckley, County Clerk, \$332 60; to W. E. Gerber, Recorder, \$307 25; to W. E. Gerber, Auditor, \$166 50.

The coroner reported that during November he signed certificates as to causes of death of six persons without holding inquests, not deeming the latter necessary. The only money which came into his hands, found upon deceased persons, was \$7 in the possession of Michael Cunningham, which was used to cover expense of his burial.

The report were, upon motion, accepted and placed on file.

J. W. Wilson presented his certificate of reelection as Supervisor of the Second District, which was received and accepted.

Upon motion, the Sarsfield Guard were granted permission to partition of a certain portion of the south end of the east half on the upper floor of the Pavilion, to be used by them for an armory, the Board reserving the right to remove the partition at their expense during the fair, and it being specified that the contrary shall put up no stove which shall invalidate or interfere with the insurance upon the building.

Further claims for rebate upon personal taxes were examined and allowed as follows: Wm. J. Davis, \$1 61; Mary V. Graham, \$4 65; Sarah Graman, \$4 50; G. K. Rider (assessed), \$4 14.

The payment of a bill for the expenses of a police officer going to Marysville to arrest Charles Johnson, for burglary within this city, was refused, upon the ground that the bill should be paid by the city.

The Board having concluded the business before it, then adjourned for the term.
