Disgraceful Scene in the House of Representatives.

COATS STRIPPED FOR A FIGHT.

Weaver and Sparks Create an Exciting Tumbler.

THE MCGARRAHAN CLAIM ONCE MORE.

What Was Accomplished in Congress Yesterday in the Way of Business.

(SPECIAL BY TELEGRAPH TO THE RECORD-UNION.)

WASHINGTON, December 21st.—The disgraceful scene in the House of Representatives this afternoon is the absorbing topic of town talk to-night, and conjecture is rife as to what will be the consequences to-morrow.

It is agreed on all hands that the two principles in this most unseemly affair must be subjected to the same discipline of a public reprimand by the Speaker of the House, and compelled to apologize for their grossly unparliamentary language and conduct, and penalty of expulsion in case of refusal.

The excitement in the hall during the progress of the altercation and for some minutes after its termination was intense almost beyond description.

When Sparks roared out "You are a scoundrel and a villain," in response to Weaver's epithet of "His Honor," Weaver rationally walked towards him, stripping off his coat as he proceeded, and Sparks, after clutching a chair for a moment as if to raise it for a weapon, commenced to take off his coat also, and moved towards his approaching adversary.

Numbers of their respective friends hastened to assist and hold them back, but Jones of Texas, a Greenback sympathizer with Weaver, had meanwhile jumped over his desk and exclaimed "Let them fight!"

"I'm in it," Mills of Texas was observed to plunge his hand into a hip pocket, as if to draw a revolver, but he was restrained by his friends.

Representative Caldwell, of New York, today submitted to the House, on behalf of the Private Land Claims Committee an advance report on the bill authorizing the Court of Claims to ascertain and determine the title to the Rancho Pancho Grande, commonly known as the McGarrahan bill.

The committee set forth that the McGarrahan claim has been before the various departments of the Government for twenty years, and then proposed to say that, without discussing the original merits of McGarrahan's bill, they are of opinion that the action contemplated by the bill should not be taken by Congress.

Myers of Indiana submitted a minority report signed by himself alone, in which it is stated that the McGarrahan bill is a matter of simple justice to McGarrahan.

Blair said there was hardly a quorum present. It was not proper to consider important measure of this kind with such a small House. Let it go over until after the holidays. He protested against an attempt to press the bill through notwithstanding the large number of absentees.

F. Wood said he was ready to let the debate run on. He had acquiesced in the desire of the House this morning in regard to that, but he was unwilling to adjourn from day to day to give gentlemen an opportunity to prepare speeches. The last vote and no vote had shown that there was in the House thirty more than a quorum. While he could not attempt to control the physical actions of any member, he felt it his duty to impress on the House, in season and out of season, the gravity of the question, and its imperative necessity.

A member of the Committee on Ways and Means bore testimony to the fact that the Chairman of the committee (Mr. Wood) had done his duty, and nothing less than his duty in pressing action on the bill.

Randall said there was no measure so important, and he did not believe there was any member that would desire to prevent at this session legislation on the subject. Congress must legislate, and it would legislate. The House was not bound to wait for gentlemen who desired to speak by the hour. It was their duty to be here and to avail themselves of their privilege. If not, it was their own fault, and public business should not be delayed. He thought it desirable that the House should proceed to consider the bill under the five minute rule.
