BOARD OF CITY TRUSTEES met yesterday at 10 A. M., for its usual session, all the members present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Chief Engineer J. A. Cunningham, in the works works, presented his report for the week ending March 1, 1881. The report shows that the water works have been running full time; that 7,017,000 gallons of water were pumped, and 1,187 cubic feet of water were used.

From W. C. Farnsworth, Superintendent of the City Cemetery, showing that during the month there were 138 burials in the city. Of these, 27 died in the city, 1 was still-born, and 9 brought here from other places.

City Treasurer W. E. Chamberlain's report shows that there was on hand in the City Treasury February 29, 1881, \$1,474,710.75. Received during the month, \$4,105.83; total, \$5,650.58.
