FOREIGN NEWS.

LAST NIGHT'S DISPATCHES TO THE RECORD-UNION.

SERIOUS OUTLOOK AT MADRID. Alfonso Saluted with the cry of "Down with the King."

THE SITUATION IN THE TRANSVAAL. Further Concessions Made to Greece by Turkey.

TRIBEY. Additional Concessions—Villages Pillaged. CONSTANTINOPLE, March 21st.—Turkey now agrees to make additional concessions to Greece in Thessaly, and Crete instead of Epirus. The Embassadors have referred the matter to their respective Governments.

GREECE. Will Move Promptly. ATHENS, March 21st.—The Premier declares that whatever may be the state of preparation, Greece must and will move promptly if the proposition of the Porte is unpalatable, unless restrained by the military pressure of the Powers.

PACIFIC COAST ITEMS. The C. and C. Arrow-gauge will reach Hawthorne, Nev., nr 1st St.

Edwards Cahota, well-educated Chinese man, is in the United States army and stationed at Fort Stanton, Col.

There are several cases of mumps and measles in Carrolville, and those afflicted with the former being a number of adults.

S. Delin has retired from the editorship of the Nevada Tri-Weekly Herald, and is succeeded by James R. Gray, one of the proprietors of that paper.

The King's River Water Company has been incorporated for the purpose of constructing canals for irrigation, navigation and manufacturing power in Fresno and Tulare counties.

The old "Padre tree" that stands in the ravine at Monterey, near the cross where Junipero Serra landed 111 years ago, shows unmistakable signs of decay. A heavy gale of wind may topple it over any day.

There is some talk of straightening the old toll-road, the "Sugar Loaf," across the ridge to the Geysers, shortening the distance from 200 to 100 miles. The Enterprise reports that the owners of the road (which cost \$13,000), will give it to the public.

Says the Fresno Herald: It is proposed to convert the Hildreth ranch into an extensive colony. The agent of a large European colony has visited the ranch and expressed himself much pleased. The agent proposes to locate 100 families on the land.

In North Denver, Col., recently, some workmen opened a well in a field where they discovered a group of skeletons—one of an immense man, and others smaller skeletons and a child. Some curious bones were found with representations of strange beasts and birds engraved upon them.

As soon as the weather settles for the season, says the Monterey Californian, Father Casanova intends opening the tomb underneath the old Carmel Mission, and hunting for the casket containing the remains of Padre Junipero Serra. This will be a very interesting sight for our people.

A total of 30,620 acres of land was sold in Baker county, Ore., in the year ending the various Acts of Congress, direct as follows: State lands, 17,800 acres; under pre-emption laws, 2,640 acres; homestead, 3,000 acres; timber culture, 1,440 acres; desert, 4,800 acres; timber lands, 280 acres.

A prominent Chinese merchant of San Francisco was in Carson, Nev., Friday, to solicit subscriptions among his countrymen for the purpose of establishing a large Chinese bank. It is stated that the guarantee in Carson amount to nearly \$10,000. The bank will begin business upon a guaranteed capital of 1,000,000 dollars.

The work on the new wharf at Lake Tahoe is being pushed with all vigor. They have succeeded in putting down five cribs already, which extends the wharf a distance of about 200 feet. The contractors intend enterprise intend extending it 160 feet further, so that it will reach deep water. The wharf is to be 14 feet wide and covered with three-inch plank.

A great many of the homicides which have occurred in western camps of late years, says the Carson (Nev.) Appeal, have arisen from the fact that somebody held four aces in poker game. Whenever a man holds four aces, he is a large fortune. In view of the extraordinary mortality connected with this unfortunate hand, it might be well for the next poker congress to abolish the ace entirely, the interests of law, order and humanity.

Says the Summit county (Col.) Times: No more sublime object of nature exists in the vicinity of that great breadth of wonderful granite Park, than the Grand canyon of the Grand river. Rising to the majestic heights of from three to five hundred feet these monuments stand silent sentinels to the great country which is drained by this mighty river. Their lofty spires, here and there showing the pinnacles and domes that have withstood the wild tempests and storms of the cycle of years, present a scene like for the painter and those who delve in the ever-changing imagery of words.

COOKING SCHOOLS.—Within a few years there has been an extraordinary development of the useful idea that the persons most interested in having appetizing and healthy food upon the tables ought to know something of the art of cooking; and as a result of this conviction cooking-schools and classes have sprung up all over the country. In many cases, no doubt, these classes have done little more than furnish a novel diversion to young ladies who have not the remotest idea of learning how to cook or of putting to any practical use the hints they may remember, but at least the tendency is always in the right direction. The idea has been practically developed in the South, and several girls' schools in that part of the country now provide training in the preparation of food as part of the regular course of instruction. Such teaching is especially valuable in the South, where in general the cooking is not done in the kitchen, as it is in the North, but in the parlors, and where, as Helen Campbell, superintendent of the Sta
