COMMERCIAL.—The steamer Governor Dana arrived from the other Sacramento night before last, and, having discharged her cargo, was taken to the opposite side of the river yesterday, and is being hauled upon the marine ways to receive thorough overhauling and repairs.

JAILER'S REPORT.—The report of Jailer Newberry to Sheriff Heilborn, of the prisoners confined in the County Jail for the month of March, shows the total number to have been 51. Of these there were for murder 1, assault to murder 2, rape 1, grand larceny 8, burglary 3, subornation of perjury 1, assault to do bodily harm 1, assault to rob 1, bigamy 1, assault with a deadly weapon 2, petty larceny 11, misdemeanor 2, battery 6, disturbing the peace 1, vagrancy 18, and other 4. There are 33 prisoners still remaining in jail.
