LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.
STAGE ROBBER SURRENDES.—Thomas Paul, the young man convicted of stage robbing in Mendocino county and sentenced to five years in the Folsom Prison, escaped about two weeks since.

Warden Pockman received a dispatch from Paul dated at Farmington, Stanislaus county, stating that he was going to give himself up. A return dispatch was sent by Mr. Pockman to the operator, which was turned over to Constable E. R. Waterhouse, at Farmington, and in reply to which he said Paul was in his charge, though he had traveled fourteen miles to come and surrender himself.

Waterhouse to take Paul to this city, where he was met by Mr. Pockman yesterday and returned to Folsom last night with the self-proclaimed prisoner. Paul is very young, being as yet under 20 years of age, and is of a highly respected family. He has about two and a half years yet to serve, and it is believed, from his statement to the Warden upon his voluntary return, that he has made up his mind to satisfy the law's demand for his present, and live above reproach in the future.

POLICE COURT.—In the Police Court yesterday, the case against Mrs. O'Brien, for violating the Health Ordinance, was continued until the 26th instant upon the promise of defendant that by that time the nuisance complained of would be abated. The examination of Charles Thompson, for grand larceny, was completed, and defendant held to answer with bail fixed at \$1,000. Ah So was found guilty of keeping an opium den, and was sentenced to 30 days in jail. Billy French was found guilty of violating the above-said ordinance, and was fined \$10 and costs, with ten days in the city jail. S. W. Burns, battery, dismissed. William Harris was found guilty of petty larceny, and will appear for judgment to day. Henry Harris, battery, case continued until the 27th instant. Mrs. Harris, disturbing the peace, granted postponement until the 26th. Jeremiah McCarty, healthy beggar, case continued until the 26th instant. Hugh Jeffrey was examined upon a charge of arson and discharged.

THE CITY LEVIES.—City Surveyor Bassett is engaged in a survey and examination of the city levees preparatory to making an estimate of the cost of building them higher and broader, as discussed and urged during the past rainy season. The survey along the city front from the foot of Y street to the railroad shops has been made and will be continued as far as Brighton. The preliminary examination will be completed in about a week, and when the estimates have been prepared it is expected the question of expending the amount necessary to carry out the plan will be submitted to the people for decision at a special election to be called for that purpose.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.—The session of the Board of Supervisors (was) resumed at 10 A. M. yesterday, and the members present except Mr. Butler. Upon motion of Supervisor Wilson, the clerk was instructed to advertise for bids for calculating the rooms on the first and second floors of the main building of the County Hospital. Also to repair the plaster in all the wards and dining-rooms. Claims were allowed to L. N. Webster, \$16; John Welch, \$10; John E. Baker, \$75; John Brennan, \$24; M. Barber, \$6; James Broder, \$16.99; T. H. Berkley, \$7. The Board then adjourned for the term.

FREIGHTS BY RAIL.—The following carloads of freight were received yesterday in this city: Two of 6, 6 of barley, 1 of hay, 2 of wheat, 2 of wood, 1 of m. of iron, 3 of bolts, 3 of granite, 1 of ice, 1 of hogs and 2 of coaches. Car-loads were shipped eastward: Four of wood, 1 of m. of iron, 1 of pig iron, 12 of barley, 1 of lumber, 2 of beans, 1 of sugar, 1 of rice and 1 of iron.

COMMERCIAL.—The steamer Enterprise came down from Colusa yesterday morning with about 100 tons of barley and 158 hogs, the latter going to Antioch. The Apache on her upward trip brought the large farm load from the Fern break. The Enterprise will leave for Jacinto this morning. The schooner D. C. Hankins arrived from San Francisco, loaded with lumber, and will be at the wharf and Friday for lumber company.

LOCAL NOTES.

The Pacific Silk Manufacturing Company, at San Jose, has filed articles of incorporation. The trustees are Chas. G. Hermann, George Wolf, H. X. Van de Castele and Alfred F. Sauffron. The capital stock is \$50,000, divided into 10,000 shares. San Francisco. Trustees—Samuel Grove, A. J. Rhodes, F. W. Bowen, C. H. Livingston and W. H. H. Hussey. The capital stock is \$500,000, divided into 25,000 shares.

The reason why the excursion train was not run from Folsom to the prison grounds on the day of the A. O. U. W. picnic, as expected, was caused some disappointment, was that a washout had cleared away a portion of the trestle between those points, and the temporary structure erected is regarded by the company as entirely unsafe for cars over. The trestle has become permanently unsafe, and this was not known until the excursion reached there.

It is stated that the Yolo millman who lost his wagon-cover by collision with a tree on Third, near L streets, during the darkness of Thursday evening, did not meet with the accident on account of the present lamps not being lighted. If he had, he would not be in the vicinity of lamps in that section, but then that part of L street will not bear much light any way.

Payments were yesterday made to the State Treasurer, as follows: By J. Scott, Treasurer of Sierra county, \$11,100 54; by Wm. January, Treasurer of Santa Clara county, \$11,115 63; by G. V. Schmitt, Treasurer of Nevada county, \$4,831 08; by George Durham, Treasurer of El Dorado county, \$3,528 63.

The present management of the Union Hotel on Mendocino street was yesterday relinquished by I. Townsend upon the expiration of his term of lease. He (Mr. Townsend) contemplates removing to Arizona or New Mexico if he finds conditions there favorable upon a trip of inspection.

A new railroad track has been laid by the Sacramento Valley Company from a point near Folsom to Natoma Grove, so that excursion trains for minutes now take passengers directly upon the grounds, which is a great improvement over past inconveniences.

The opening of Richmond Grove, which was postponed last Sunday on account of the rain, will take place to-morrow. Melville Clayton's full brass band will be in attendance, and various amusements will be presented.

The State Medical Society, which has just held its annual session, elected Dr. G. G. Tyrell, of this city, President for the ensuing year; also Dr. L. E. Ostman, Treasurer, and Dr. W. A. Briggs, Secretary.

The market proprietors in the city have decided and agreed among themselves that they will keep their markets closed on Sunday after May 1st, and will not deliver goods except on that day.

Minnie Fountain, Wm. Hadger and E. M. Jackson were arrested night before last upon the charge of burglary, for going to the Richmond House and taking a trunk which was held for room rent.

The alarm of fire between 6 and 7 o'clock last evening was caused by a chimney burning out at the house of George Moore, on L, between Fourth and Fifth streets. No damage.

The Sacramento Parlor of Native Sons of the Golden West, held a banquet at Fisher's this evening, at which the Parlor from Stockton and Marysville will be present.

Alexander Gordon was yesterday commissioned by Governor Perkins as a member of the District Board of Agriculture No. 5, vice Erkson, resigned.

An attempt was made to burglarize the residence of J. Debois on Ninth street, between M and N, night before last, but it was unsuccessful.

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MINING NOTES.

The Tybo (Nevada) mill has started up again. New capital has taken hold of the district. Swinging silver-plated amalgamating plates for float gold are coming into extensive use. In Beverage District, Inyo county, nineteen Mexican arastras lately cleaned up over \$8,000.

Chino, San Bernardino county, has the placer mining fever, gold having been found in a wheat-field. Siskiyou miners on Scott River and Humboldt Bar are making preparations for extensive mining operations.

The Tombstone Nugget says that the Huachuca Mountains are the most interesting mineral field in Arizona. Some new placers were discovered about a mile and a half south of Cerrillos, New Mexico, last week, containing heavy shot gold.

Cornell is a new mining town. It is in Montezuma canyon, A. T. Herford is another new camp. It is on the San Pedro river. There are four furnaces in course of erection in Globe District, A. T. These are for copper, etc. In every direction the copper is a busy look.

The Kanaka claim, in Klamath river, which paid so rich last fall, will be opened and worked on a more extensive scale this season. This is probably the richest claim on the Klamath.


