Meeting at San Francisco-Report to the Governor.

Railroad Commissioners-Report to the Governor.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10th.-The Railroad Commission met this morning, Commissioners Cone, Beerstecher and Stoneham present.

On calling the meeting to order, Commissioner Stoneham rose to a question of privilege, referring to the reported interview with Commissioner Beerstecher, as published after the last meeting, denied the statements therein set forth, as far as they related to him.

REPORT TO THE GOVERNOR. Commissioner Beerstecher then presented a voluminous report, signed by himself and Commissioner Cone, and addressed to Governor Perkins, of which the following is a summary: The reduction made by the Board in the rate of freight affects grain, wool, wood, hay, cattle, hogs, sheep and other livestock but abundant products depending upon cheap transportation for successful production.

For the present the Commissioners adopt the existing rates on general merchandise as a maximum, and have not thought advisable at present to make any changes in the passenger tariff.

Although there was a demand on the part of the public for sweeping reductions, the Board, after investigating, came to the conclusion that "arbitrary and blind action would not be taken without putting at risk the interests of the public equity with those of the railroads."

In this opinion the Board found itself supported by similar Boards of other States, and was fortified in the conclusion by every step in its own researches.

The stability of its factors, the necessity of taking into account considerations which could not be dealt with save on the spur of the moment, the relation of particular interests, the equities of the case on both sides, the main elements of the cost of transportation, and of the remuneration of the employees, and such convince us that to undertake to compile a classified tariff from a standpoint which practically ignored some of the most vital factors of railroad management, would be simply to invite to the opponents of regulation a plausible argument against any further experiment in that direction.

The report then goes on to consider the difference in the way of determining what is a reasonable tariff, and states that the belief that railroad rates are often fixed with a view to furnish certain percentages of profit upon a certain amount of real or fictitious capital, is fallacious.

The watering of stock has no practical connection with freight or passenger charges. Whoever doubts this may satisfy himself by a careful review of all stock-watering transactions which have taken place in this country during the past ten years, and a comparison between these transactions and the current tariffs.

The question of what are reasonable rates may be supposed to depend largely upon the amount of railroad earnings; but in what proportion these earnings are divided in a manner concerning which is most radical difference of views exists.

The report then refers to the extensive railroad system of California, which had out-run the wants of the country, the limited amount of traffic carried and the consequent loss in the value of railroad traffic.

Attention is called to the difference in status between roads on the coast and those in the interior States, where competition enters as a powerful factor in fixing the rates.

The report also alludes to the fact that the merchant has been unable to tell the "day to day" what the staples in which he dealt would be in demand, and he has been obliged to diminish his stock without encountering most serious risks.

It was in this way all business has been disturbed, and uncertainty and loss have been entailed upon the commercial classes.

The report then refers to the absence of fluctuations in the rate of interest in this State, as in instances that the railroad companies have not engaged in speculative operations.

The report also alludes to the fact that the practice of charging according to the value of merchandise is the best of the expedients of transportation of the public.

The railroad maxim, that "the higher the maximum the lower the minimum rate will be," is enunciated, and an attempt is made to show the application.

To make large reductions upon general merchandise would be to cripple transportation, but, in fact, it would still more certainly cripple production, for these interests are linked together.

In the following report the report states that reductions in the class of freight mentioned above were necessary, for their market value is low, and it is so restricted by competition that it can seldom be carried. If, therefore, these staples cannot be carried by free freight, they must be carried at a rate which will not be beyond engaging the State in interminable legislation; but by setting before ourselves a standard of equity as a goal for our conduct, we have succeeded in obtaining from the railroad companies acquiescence in a scheme of reduction which must be productive of great present benefits to the public, and which affords an encouraging earnest of future progress.

The report was adopted, and the Board adjourned till 11 o'clock to-morrow morning.
